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
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District Map

CHAPTER 1

Introduction

District at a Glance

Background: Chuadanga sub-division was under the district of Nadia before the Partition in 1947. During this period the whole territory of Chuadanga sub-division was included in Kushtia district. It was upgraded to a separate district on the 26th February, 1984. There are different opinions about the origin of the name of the district. There is a popular view that one Persian Businessman named 'Chua Malik' was very prominent in the area of Chuadanga district headquarters. The name of the district might have been derived from the name of that Persian Businessman.

Historical Events: Under British rule, Chuadanga was a sub-division of Nadia District. In the beginning of the British rule, the people of Chuadanga participated in many uprisings and democratic movements. Their contributions to uprisings and movements including the Wahabi Movement (1831), Faraizi Movement (1838-47), Sepoy Revolt (1857), Indigo Rebellion (1859-60), Khilafat Movement (1920), Swadeshi Movement (1906), Violation of Law and Satyagraha Movements (1920-40), Quit India Movement or August Revolt (1942) and Freedom Movement are notable. During Bangladesh Liberation War of 1971, Chuadanga was the location of some early battles between the Pakistan Army and the Mukti Bahini pro-independence forces. More than 100 battles took place here. On 26 March 1971, the first war command was set up in this area, under the leadership of Major Abu Osman Chowdhury and Dr. Ashabul Haque Joarder. This region is also the place where Bangladesh Red Cross Society was formed. Chuadanga was liberated from the hands of occupying Pakistan Army on 7 December 1971.

Geographical Area and Location: The district is surrounded on the north by Kushtia and Meherpur districts, on the east by Jhenaidah district, on the south by Jhinaidah district and on the west by Meherpur district and India. The total area of the district is 1157.42 sq. km. (446.88 sq. miles). The district lies between 23° 22' and 23°50' north latitude and between 88°39' and 89°00' east longitude. Chuadanga town is situated on the bank of the river Mathabhang. Chuadanga town is established as municipal town in 1960 and started functioning in 1965. The total area of the town is 36.12 sq. km.

Administration. Chuadanga district consists of 4 upazilas, 32 unions, 382 mauzas, 523 villages, 4 municipalities, 36 wards and 69 mahallas. The upazilas are Chuadanga Sadar, Alamdanga, Damurhuda, Jibannagar. Municipalities are Chuadanga Sadar, Alamdanga, Darshana and Jibannagar.

Archaeological Heritage and Relics: Three domes of Chuadanga are: Bara Mosque, Gholdari Mosque (1006 AD), Thakurpur Mosque, Shibnagar Mosque, Jamjami Mosque, Hazar Duari School (Damurhuda), Karpasdanga Neelkuthi and Gholdari Neelkuthi.

Marks of War of Liberation: Marks of the Liberation in the district include a spot behind the Chuadanga Central Hospital. Mass killing site: A spot behind the Chuadanga Sadar Hospital; mass grave: 3, places on the back of the Natudaha High School, at village Dhopakhali near the

Jibannagar border and on the bank of GK Canal near Alamdanga Railway Station; memorial monument 2.

Locally Published Newspapers and Periodicals: Dainik Mathavanga, Dainik Pratham Rajdhani, Weekly Chaudanga Darpan, Weekly Chaudanga Samachar and Weekly Din Badaler Kagaj are locally published newspapers of Chuadanga district.

Cultural Organizations: The numbers of cultural organisation of this district are club 81, press club 9, public library 4, cinema hall 10, theatre group 27, theatre stage 2, women's organisation 4, literary society 1, stadium 1 and auditorium 4.

Main Crops: Paddy, jute, wheat, potato, sugarcane, brinjal, onion, garlic, pulses, betel leaf and pumpkin are cultivable crops. Extinct or nearly extinct crops of Chuadanga district are sesame, linseed, tobacco, mustard seed and indigo.

Main Fruits: Mango, jackfruit, litchi, papaya, guava, coconut and banana are main fruits of the district.

Traditional Transport: Horse carriage and bullock cart and boat are traditional transports found in this district.

Manufacturing Industries: Among the manufacturing industries, cotton mills, sugar mill, bread and biscuit factory, spinning mills, textile mills, aluminium factory, pharmaceuticals, rice mill, chira mill, oil mill, flour mill, ice factory, saw mill and welding are found.

Hats, Bazars and Fairs: Total number of hats and bazars are 96. Among them most notable are Chuadanga, Sarajganj, Badarganj, Alamdanga, Munshiganj, Gokulkhali, Asmankhali, Hatboalia, Dugdugi, Jibannagar, Shialmari, Damurhuda, Bhalaipur and Bara Bazar. The fairs are Garaitupi Merete Mela, Baruni and Gangapuja Melas.

Main Export Items: Paddy, jute, biscuit, sugar, tobacco, sugarcane, date molasses, betel leaf, mango, jackfruit, banana and vegetables are main export items of the district.

NGO Activities: Operationally important NGOs are Brac, Care, Asa, Caritas, Grameen Bank, Tmss, Atmobiswas, Impact, Janakalayan, Palli Unnayan Sangstha, Pratyasha, Srijani, Jagarani Chakra, Wave Foundation, Usha and Buro Bangladesh.

Health Centre: The numbers of different health centres of the district are sadar hospital 1, upazila health complex 4, family planning centre 29, satellite clinic 3, TB hospital 1, diabetic hospital 1, eye hospital 1, maternity and child care centre 1 and infectious diseases hospital 1.

Economic Situation: Different types of economic activities and industries are playing vital role in the development of Chuadanga district. Major industries include Zaman Group of Industries, Bangas Bread and Biscuit, Tallu Spinning Mills Ltd, Carew & Company Bangladesh Limited. Carew & Company Bangladesh Limited(1933) which is situated at Darshana of Damurhuda Upazilla of Chuadanga district is the largest sugar mill of Bangladesh. Carew & Company has a

distillery also which is the lone wine producing plant of Bangladesh, it is an enterprise of Bangladesh Sugar & Food Industries Corporation(BSFIC).

Flora and Fauna

Flora: Chuadanga district is located at mid west part of Bangladesh. Major portion of the west and the south boundary line of the district borders west Bengal (India), In the recent past Chuadanga was a part of greater Kushtia district and plants growing in the district are almost similar to those growing in the adjacent Kushtia and Meherpur districts. Earlier, the major portion of the district was covered with bamboo clumps and other indigenous low jungle growths interlaced with wild creepers which are used for fuel.

The highways of the district were planted with mahogani (*Swietenia macrophylla*), teak, shishu (*Dalbergia sissoo*) and raintree (*Samanca saman*) khayer tree are quite common. Date palm (*Phoenix sylvestris*) are widely grown in the district for juice and patali gur, popularly known as khajur gur. Palmyra palm tree (*Borassus fabelliferl*) also are grown to a considerable extent from which juice is obtained for brewing tari (liquor), a sort of gur and sugar candy known as Talmisri is also made out of it. Large areas which were formerly covered with jungles, have been brought

under cultivation by the refugees from West Bengal. The stretches of low lying land under rice cultivation afford a foothold for many species, while the numerous ponds and ditches are filled with submerged and floating water plants. The edges of sluggish creeks are lined with large sedges and bulrushes, and the banks of rivers frequently have a hedge like shrub jungle. The sides of embankments and village sites, where not occupied by human habitations, are densely covered with large growths of semi spontaneous vegetation, often interspersed with clumps of planted bamboos and groves of areca, moringa, mangifera and anona. Waysides and waste places are filled with grasses and weeds usually of little intrinsic interest, but sometimes striking because of their distribution. A large proportion of the species of this class to be met with in the district has been inadvertently introduced by human agency. In many places of the district, the soil does not seem to suit some important common indigenous fruit trees and consequently the poorer class are in times of scarcity and famine, deprived of one resource which they can fall back upon in more favored districts.

Among the common varieties of trees the following are found in abundance. Mango (*Mangifera indica*) is generally grown in orchards with much care and properly nursed and reared. All the varieties of superior quality mangoes are grown in big orchards, the popular varieties are bombay, gopalbhoge, langra and fazli, jackfruit (*Artocarpus heterophyllus*) are also widely grown. Black berry (*Syzygium cumini*), guava (*Psidium guajava*), shimul (*Bombax ceiba*) palas (*Butea monosperma*), sonalu, pitraj (*Aphanamixis polystachia*), kanai, suruj and a host of other trees grown wild in fallow and vacant lands and abandoned orchards, on banks of derelict tanks, on the edges of the marshes and other unexploited places. Banyan (*Ficus benghalensis*), Peepal (*Ficus religiosa*), neem (*Azadirachta indica*), krishnachura (*Delonix regia*) babla (*Acacia nilotica*), grown wild at all convenient places. Among the palm group (*Borassus Flabellifer*), palmyra palm, date-plum/khajur (*Phoenix sylvestris*), areca nut and coconut (*Cocos nucifera*) are commonly grown around homestead, paddy fields, banks of tanks and ditches. Various kinds of reeds abound in the marshes, derelict tanks, ditches and choked up rivers.

Fauna: Among the carnivores, tigers were commonly found at the beginning of the 19th century in the more sparsely inhabited portion of the district. However many years have passed since the last of these animals disappeared and none are now to be seen nearer than in the Sundarbans. Leopards, however, continued to be fairly common in the district. Wild hogs were also common, especially where they were protected for the purpose of pig-sticking. But the days of pig-sticking have long gone. Among the lesser fauna are foxes, hares, porcupines, jackal (*Canis aureus*), monkey (*Macaca mullata*), wild-cats/ban biral (*Felis chaus*), etc. Occasionally crocodiles (*Crocodylus porosus*), come during the rainy season up the rivers Padma and other.

Of game birds, the florican used to breed on the vast lonely fields of the district but they deserted the district during the latter part of the rains and the beginning of the cold weather various finds of wild duck and other aquatic birds are found in large numbers in the district during the cold weather. Big and small snipes in great numbers are available like the end of March in the big beels and the rivers. A few partridges and quails are occasionally met with.

Among the common birds crows and kites including brahmani kites are abundant as in all other districts of Bangladesh. Vultures and eagles are seldom seen. Hawks and owls are also uncommon. Among small birds of handsome plumage or otherwise attractive appearance are the hoopoe, the golden oriole, the blue joy, the bee-eaters with long slender bills, swallows, martins (*Acridotheres ginginianus*), mainas (*Gracula religiosaautra*), eagle (*Spilornis cleela*), and kingfishers (*Alcedo atthis*) are also very common.

Snakes, mostly poisonous are very common in the district. Cobras of various types, panak and king cobra prefer high lands, alats usually prefer water edges, darash (*Ptyas mucous*) and shankhur are also commonly found. gui-shap (*Varanus salvator*) eat away the eggs laid by snakes and mongoose fight and kill them.

Concepts and Definitions

1. Population and Housing Census 2011

The population and housing census is the unique source of reliable and comprehensive data about the size of the population of the country, major socio-economic and socio-demographic characteristics.

It is the total process of collecting, compiling, evaluating, analyzing and publishing or otherwise disseminating demographic, economic and social data pertaining, at a specified time, to all persons in a country. The essential features of a population census are individual enumeration, universality within a defined territory, simultaneity and defined periodicity.

The population and housing census provides information on the geographic and administrative distribution of the population and household in addition to the demographic and socioeconomic characteristics of all the people in the country. The data from the census are classified, tabulated and disseminated so that political leaders, election officials, planners, national organizations including NGOs and civil society, regional and international organizations can use the data in decision-making.

The purpose of community report is to disseminate census data by communities (ward/mahalla in urban area and union/mauza/village in rural area). Data on all key variables namely area, household, population by sex and age group, ethnic population, literacy rate, marital status, school attendance, employment status and religion as well as physical facilities such as source of drinking water, sanitation, electricity and dwelling units have been presented in this report. The planners, researchers and policy makers as well as development partners and community administrators will find this report as a valuable reference for use in advising plans and programs for advancing welfare and well-being of the common people, in particular and the community in general.

Household

Persons, either related or unrelated, living together and taking food from the same kitchen constitute a household. A single person living and eating alone forms one-person household.

Literacy

It denotes ability to write a letter in any language. Literacy status assessment is made for population 7 years and over.

Community

It refers to the following five lower geographic, administrative or revenue units:

- i) **Union:** Smallest administrative rural geographic unit comprising of mauzas and villages and having union parishad institution.
- ii) **Mauza :** Mauza is the lowest administrative unit having a separate jurisdiction list number (J.L. Number) in revenue records. Every mauza has its well-demarcated cadastral map. Mauza should be distinguished from local village since a mauza may consist of one or more villages.

- iii) **Village:** Lowest rural geographic unit either equivalent to a mauza or part of a mauza.
- iv) **Ward:** Smallest administrative urban geographic unit comprising of mahallas and having ward council institution.
- v) **Mahalla:** Lowest urban geographic unit having identifiable boundaries.

Urban Area

It corresponds with area developed around a central place having such amenities as metalled roads, improved communication, electricity, gas, water supply, sewerage, sanitation and also having comparatively higher density of population with majority population in non-agricultural occupations.

- i) **City Corporation:** It includes city corporation area declared by the Ministry of Local Government.
- ii) **Paurashava/Municipality Area:** It includes paurashavas incorporated and administered by local government under Paurashava Ordinance, 1977.

2. Agriculture Census year and reference period

The census year extends over twelve consecutive months having for different census items the different reference periods or days of data collections. Some items have a year or week reference period. Some others have a specific reference day.

The census year covered twelve months from 1 Baishak to 30 Choitra, 1414 Bangla Shal (BS). The year was the reference period for such census items as operated land use, crops, agriculture employment, livestock & poultry deaths and agriculture loan. A single reference day was used for items like holdings, farm size, land tenure, farm population, livestock & poultry inventories and agriculture implements.

The different census items by their reference periods or days are shown below:

Agriculture holding

An agriculture holding is a techno-economic unit of agricultural production under single management comprising all livestock kept and all land used wholly or partly for agricultural production purposes without regard to title, legal form or size. Single management may be exercised by either an individual holder or jointly by two or more individuals or holders or by a judicial person such as a corporation, co-operative or government agency. A holding may consist of one or more parcels (fragments of land) located in one or more areas or mauzas or in more than one administrative unit or division provided that all separate parcels of fragments form parts of same technical unit under operational control of same management.

The definition covers practically all holdings/households engaged in agricultural production of both crops and livestock. Some agriculture holdings may have no significant agricultural land, e.g. holdings keeping livestock, poultry and hatcheries for which land is not an indispensable input for production.

Farm holding

A farm holding is defined as being an agricultural production unit having cultivated land equal to or more than 0.05 acres. Farm holdings are classified into following three broad groups:

- (a) **small:** Farm holdings having minimum cultivated land 0.05 acre but operated land more than this minimum but upto 2.49 acres.
- (b) **medium:** Farm holdings having operated land in between 2.50 to 7.49 acres.
- (c) **large:** Farm holdings having operated land 7.50 acres and above.

Small cultivated land 0.04 acre or less is generally used for kitchen garden growing mainly vegetables. Often seeds of white gourd, water gourd, pumpkin and other strains are sown on households; but these creepers spread out around house roofs and other structures. As such, the minimum cultivated land considered for qualifying to be a farm holding is 0.05 acres.

Non-farm holdings

A non-farm holding is defined as being the one which has neither cultivated nor operated land or has cultivated land less than 0.05 acre.

Tenancy

Owner holdings are those having and operating their owned land and who may or may not be leasing out land.

Tenant holdings are those having no owned land but operating land taken from others on share cropping basis or on other terms.

Owner-cum-tenant holdings are those having owned land and who may or may not be leasing out their own land to others and who may be taking land from others on share cropping basis or on other terms.

Agriculture work

Agriculture work signifies all activities of holder and his/her labour force doing planning, management, and operation of a holding. It includes land preparation, sowing, weeding, harvesting, feeding and tending livestock & poultry, kitchen gardening, supervising agricultural workers, keeping farm records & accounts, preparing agriculture products for marketing (including packaging), repairing farm equipment, constructing farm buildings & fences, and engaging in land reclamation and improvement and other related activities. It excludes home and other family domestic chores.

Area under pond

The pond area remains under water almost through out the year. Normally, households use pond water for various domestic and sometimes agriculture purposes. Ponds are also generally used for fish culture.

In the census the pond area data were collected separately for both single ownership and joint ownership of households.

Area under temporary crops

It is the land area planted to crops having growing cycle or length of life less than one year. These are the temporary crops such as paddy, wheat, jute, cotton, tobacco, sugarcane, pulses, oil seeds, potato, vegetables and other seasonal crops. A list of temporary crops for which data were collected separately was given in back page of "Tally Sheet". The minimum area recorded for a temporary crop was 0.01 acre. Area under temporary crops and temporary-crops net area are equivalents.

Area under permanent crops

It is the land area planted to crops which remain standing for a long period of time and do not need to be replanted after a seasonal harvest. Mango, jackfruit, coconut, guava, lemon, and other fruit varieties are all permanent crops.

Current fallow

It is land brought into cultivation but left out uncultivated in census year for fertility regaining and improvement or for other reasons.

Net cultivated area

This is land area actually cropped during the census year regardless of number of crops grown plus current fallow. It includes areas under temporary and permanent crops and also current fallow.

Permanent fallow

It is land not available for cultivation due to coming into residence and commercial & other uses. Play ground, graveyard, wild shrubs and jungles, marshy land, and the like fall in this category.

Irrigated area

This is area of total land brought under irrigation coverage for growing crops with irrigations done through mechanical or manual means. Irrigated area classifications fall into two categories: (1) surface water irrigation with main water sources being rivers, canals, beels, ponds, and other water bodies; and (2) underground water irrigation with water lifted by shallow tube-wells, deep tube-wells, and country traditional devices. The irrigation equipments are run by electricity, diesel or petrol, or manual labour.

Cattle and Buffalo

Cattle and buffalo heads owned by households on day of enumeration were counted.

Goats and Sheep

Goats and sheep owned by households on day of enumeration were counted.

Fowls, Ducks and Pigeons

Fowls, ducks, and pigeons owned by households on day of enumeration were counted.

Temporary crops gross area

Areas aggregated for all temporary crops grown in the census year have made **temporary crops gross area** greater than **temporary crops net area** since the latter has within it the same land cropped more than once in different seasons of a year.

Intensity of cropping

It is percentage of temporary crops gross area in comparison with temporary crops net area. It is expressed as follows:

$$\text{Intensity of cropping} = \frac{\text{Temporary crops gross area}}{\text{Temporary crops net area}} \times 100$$

Cereals

Main cereals are rice and then wheat. Other cereals are jab, barley, cheena, maize, kaun, bajra and joar.

Pulses

Main and common pulses are gram, mung, lentil, arhar, gari kalai, khesari and pea.

Oil seeds

Main oil seeds are rape and mustard, sesamum, linseed, groundnut, soybean, sunflower and castor.

Vegetables

Farmers grow both summer and winter vegetables. Main vegetables are potato, brinjal, raddish, arum, lady's finger, cauliflower, cabbage, bean, tomato, patal, gourd, cucumber, pumpkin, knoll-kal-turnip, dhundal, barbati, khirai, chichinga, carrot, kakrol and sak.

Cash crop

Main cash crops are jute, mesta, sunhemp, cotton, sugarcane and tobacco.

Spices

The main spices include turmeric, ginger, chillies, onion, garlic, corriander, black cumin and ani seed.

Fuel crops

Dhaincha and other smaller plants used as cooking-fuel are included in the group.
