

Monthly Report on Fiscal-Macro Position

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Executive Summary

The February 2024 issue of the report on the Fiscal-Macro position contains relevant data and analysis on the movement of major macroeconomic variables in the current month compared to the same period of the previous year. An overview of the report is given below:

Fiscal Sector

Revenue collection after February FY24 demonstrated uptrend as Tax revenue increase by 12.11 percent and non-tax revenue increased by 13.98 percent than that of July-February FY23. The overall increase in revenue is 12.32 percent on July-February FY24 compared to that of February FY23. Total operating expenses increased by 10.73 percent to Tk. 216,381.46 crore in July-February FY24 compared to Tk. 195,407.19 crore in July-February FY23. However, the ADP implementation in July-February FY24 increased by 42.06 percent compared to that of July-February FY23. Overall government expenditure increased by 12.12 percent in July-February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23¹.

Monetary Sector

Broad money (M2) increased by 8.89 percent at the end of February FY24 compared to that of February FY23. Of the sources of broad money, Net Domestic Asset (NDA) increased by 14.39 percent while Net Foreign Asset decreased by 16.45 percent. Reserve money decreased by 0.72 percent at the end of February 2024 compared to that of February 2023. Money multiplier rose to 5.44 at the end of February 2023 from 4.92 at the end of June 2023.

External Sector

Export increased by 3.71 percent after February FY24 compared to the export after February FY23. Imports decreased by 15.48 percent after February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23. The LCs settlement deceased by 15.10 percent after February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23. Letter of Credit (LC) opening started to decreased and on a year-on year basis it was 3.63 percent lower in February FY24 than the same period of the previous FY. Workers' remittances after February FY24 increased by 7.63 percent to USD 15,083.52 million against USD 14,013.98 million after February FY23. The current account surplus became US\$ 4762 million compared to a deficit of US\$ -3455 million for the same period of the previous fiscal year and overall deficit stood at US\$ 4.4 billion at the end of February FY24 compared to a 7.9 billion US\$ deficit in the same time of the previous year. Gross foreign exchange reserves stood at USD 25.97 billion in February FY24 which was sufficient to pay import liability of 4.6 months, considering the average of the previous 12 months' imports.

Real Sector

The industrial production of Large Scale, SMME Scale and Cottage Scale increased -0.61 percent, 7.93 percent and 6.11 percent respectively during February 2023. Point to point inflation decreased to 9.67 percent in February FY24 from 9.86 percent of January FY24. On twelve-month average basis inflation rose to 9.66 percent in February FY24 from 9.59 percent in January FY24, which is 3.66 percentage point higher than the target of 6.0 percent for FY24.

1. FISCAL SECTOR

1.1 Revenue Earnings

Revenue collection after February FY24 demonstrated uptrend as Tax revenue increase by 12.11 percent and non-tax revenue increased by 13.98 percent than that of July-February FY23. The overall increase in revenue is 12.32 percent on July-February FY24 compared to that of February FY23.




Chart 1.1: Trend of Government's monthly revenue earnings

1.2 Government Expenditure

Total operating expenses increased by 10.73 percent to Tk. 216,381.46 crore in July-February FY24 compared to Tk. 195,407.19 crore in July-February FY23. However, the ADP implementation in July-February FY24 increased by 42.06 percent compared to that of July-February FY23. The case of overall development expenditure increased by 38.64 percent than that of previous year. Overall government expenditure increased by 12.12 percent in July-February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23. According to the Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation Division (IMED) of the Ministry of Planning, the execution rate of ADP is 31.17 percent.

1.3 Budget Deficit

The budget deficit (including grants) for July-Feb of FY24 was Tk 32433.26 crore which is -0.64 percent of the projected GDP for FY24. For the same period of the previous Fiscal Year, the overall budget deficit had been taka 30326.46 crore which was -0.68 percent of GDP of that year.

1.4 Deficit Financing

The government arranged its financing requirement from the banking system in the second month of the fiscal year to repay the non-bank borrowing loans undertaken in the past. Therefore, the Government has financed its budget deficit predominantly from the bank in February FY24.



1.4.1 National Savings Certificates (NSCs)

NSCs sales increased by 0.15 percent for July-February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23. The net sale of NSCs during July- February of FY24 decreased by 153.56 percent compared to the same period of the previous year. The outstanding stock of NSCs stands at taka 351,813.25 crore at the end of February FY24 which is 2.41 percent lower compared to that of February FY23.

2. MONETARY SECTOR

2.1 Monetary and Credit Development

Broad money (M2) increased by 8.89 percent at the end of February FY24 compared to that of February FY23. Of the sources of broad money, Net Domestic Asset (NDA) increased by 14.39 percent while Net Foreign Asset decreased by 16.45 percent. Despite strong public sector credit growth, government borrowing from the banking system contributed to the less than expected credit growth in the private sector. Broad money growth in February FY24 was 1.73 percent compared to that of June FY23.

2.2 Reserve Money Development

Reserve money decreased by 0.72 percent at the end of February 2024 compared to that of February 2023. Money multiplier rose to 5.44 at the end of February 2023 from 4.92 at the end of June 2023, resulting from a decrease of reserve deposit ratio. However, the rise of currency deposit ratio had offset the rise of multiplier to some extent.

3. EXTERNAL SECTOR

3.1 Exports

In February FY24, total exports continued to grow above the strategic target. Export increased by 3.71 percent after February FY24 compared to the export after February FY23. This higher growth in export is due to strong rebound in demand for apparels in the major export destinations of Bangladesh, as the economies are recovering from the shock of the Covid-19 pandemic.



3.2 Imports (C & F)

Imports decreased by 15.48 percent after February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23. Import showing down trend due to some tuff monitoring measures taken by Bangladesh Bank. The trend is also seen in the fact that LCs settlement deceased by 15.10 percent after February FY24 compared to that of July-February FY23. Due to various measures of the government to curtail import, Letter of Credit (LC) opening started to decreased and on a year-on year basis it was 3.63 percent lower in February FY24 than the same period of the previous FY.



3.3 Remittances

Workers' remittances after February FY24 increased by 7.63 percent to USD 15,083.52 million against USD 14,013.98 million after February FY23. Various initiatives of the Government to incentivize remittance inflow such as 2.5 percent cash incentive, easing the rules on the furnishing of documents and depreciation of exchange rate (BDT/USD) might have worked on the overseas migrants to send remittances through legal channel. The rising number of labour migration in FY22 may also have a positive impact on inward remittances.

3.4 Balance of Payments (BOP)

The trade deficit gap narrowed in July-February of FY24 compared to the same period of the previous fiscal year as the import is put under stern monitoring by the Bangladesh Bank. The current account surplus became US\$ 4762 million compared to a deficit of US\$ -3455 million for the same period of the previous fiscal year. But due to negative growth in the financial account the overall deficit stood at US\$ 4.4 billion at the end of February FY24 compared to a 7.9 billion US\$ deficit in the same time of the previous year.



3.5 External Reserve

Gross foreign exchange reserves stood at USD 25.97 billion in February FY24 which was sufficient to pay import liability of 4.6 months, considering the average of the previous 12 months' imports.

Chart 3.4: Foreign Exchange Reserve (End of the month)



3.6 Exchange Rate Movements

Exchange rate of Bangladesh Taka, against USD, depreciated by 1.49 percent during July-February of FY24 compared to the July-February of FY23. To contain the persistent foreign exchange pressure during FY23, Bangladesh Bank as well as the government took various policy measures; aided by steady inflow of remittances and lower import payments.


4.1 Industrial Production

4.2 CPI Inflation

Point to point inflation decreased to 9.67 percent in February FY24 from 9.86 percent of January FY24 where food inflation decreased from 9.56 to 9.44 percent, non-food inflation decreased from 8.42 to 9.33 percent. On twelve-month average basis inflation rose to 9.66 percent in February FY24 from 9.59 percent in January FY24, which is 3.66 percentage point higher than the target of 6.0 percent for FY24.

4.3 GDP Growth Outlook

The latest publication of the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS) (with the new base 2015-16) shows that GDP grew by 5.78 percent in FY23. With this growth, per capita GNI rose to US\$ 2,749 at the end of FY23. According to the Medium-Term Macroeconomic Policy Statement (FY24 to FY26), the growth target for FY24 is 7.50 percent.
