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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Project Description. ADB approved the Urban Infrastructure Improvement Preparatory Facility, a project readiness financing (PRF) loan to strengthen Narayanganj City Corporation's (NCC) technical and implementation capacity to prepare the proposed project. The PRF supported the preparation of feasibility studies, detailed designs, draft bidding documents, and advance procurement for the Narayanganj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project (NGRUDP). The project intends to improve urban living conditions in Narayanganj City, adjacent to Dhaka. The project will (i) ensure long-term water security in selected zones in NCC areas by improving and expanding the water supply system, (ii) improve living conditions by developing or upgrading stormwater drainage systems in priority areas, and (iii) improve urban mobility by laying a riverside road within NCC with adjoining public spaces. This project will support infrastructure development in Narayanganj City by building upon infrastructure and capacity-building initiatives. The project will also support institutional strengthening of NCC in the optimal operation and maintenance of the project assets, in providing other basic urban services, and in the digitalization of administrative services.

Project Components. The existing drainage system in Narayanganj comprises 518.01 km of roadside drains, mainly of concrete rectangular cross-section. The system does not succeed in satisfactorily discharging storm flows, and flooding frequently occurs during the rainy season. In addition, several waterlogged areas exist within the city. The project includes cleaning and pressure jetting the 151.021 km drainage network, constructing 21.49 km of new drainage system, and rehabilitating 19.923 km of existing drains within three drainage zones (zones 1, 3, and 4). In addition, the existing main 13.69 km of *khals* (drains) will be relined and provided with walkways and green spaces.

Resettlement Plan. This draft resettlement has been prepared to address the potential temporary involuntary resettlement impacts on non-titled roadside vendors along the drainage alignment in Zones 1, 3, and 4 of Narayanganj City and is consistent with the entitlement matrix for the project prepared in accordance with the national laws and ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS), 2009. The draft plan will be updated based on the final engineering design, detailed measurement survey, census survey, and site-specific consultations before the start of civil works and disclosed to the affected persons and on the NCC and ADB websites.

Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement Impacts. The project does not involve any acquisition of private land or permanent involuntary resettlement impacts. The project components are proposed to be constructed on government-owned vacant land and within the existing rights of way (ROW) of roads and drains belonging to the government. However, the construction and rehabilitation of the drainage system in the Narayanganj will involve temporary income loss to vendors/ mobile vendors along the road/drain margins and impact to structures such as ramps due to excavation of trench for construction of new drains and associated civil works. Based on the sample survey, the project is estimated to have a temporary livelihood impact on 223 businesses, and nine common property resources will temporarily lose access. The businesses are mostly carried out in pushcarts, display tables, and baskets. Types of businesses include those selling vegetables, fruits, food items, groceries, clothes, electronic items, mobile phone accessories, etc.

Socio-economic Information and Profile. Based on the detailed design, a 100% socio-economic survey and transect walk were conducted on the entire stretch where civil works would be carried out. It is estimated that temporary income loss due to access disruption is envisaged on 223 non-titled road-side businesses (vendors, hawkers,) having a total of 860 affected persons

with an average family size of 3.84. The average monthly income of the business owners ranges between BDT 200 and 1500. All 223 households belong to the vulnerable category on account of being non-titled.

Tribes, Minor Races, Ethnic Sects, and Communities (TMRESC). Based on the Population and Housing Census 2011, Narayanganj district as a whole has 183 households belonging to TMRESC (indigenous peoples), which comprise 0.03% of the total households of the district.¹ No presence of TMRESC is reported within NCC limits. The surveys have not revealed the presence of any TMRESC population living within the proposed project area. No direct or indirect impacts to the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems or territories, or natural or cultural resources that are used, owned, occupied, or claimed by TMRESC population/indigenous peoples as their ancestral domain or asset, is anticipated. The surveys have not revealed the presence of any TMRESC population living within the proposed project area. The NGRUDP is classified as Category C for indigenous peoples impacts as per the ADB's SPS, 2009.

Legal Framework. The policy framework and entitlements are based on the following laws and policies: the Government of Bangladesh's Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property Act (ARIPA), 2017, and ADB's SPS, 2009. There is no street vendors act or any other policy applicable to roadside businesses in Bangladesh.

Entitlements, Assurances, and Benefits. The project will likely have the following impacts requiring compensation and/or mitigation measures: (i) temporary loss of income to businesses and (ii) vulnerable assistance and shifting assistance to affected non-titled businesses. Affected persons are entitled to compensation and resettlement benefits as specified in the entitlement matrix.

Consultation and Disclosure. During the impact assessment and project information dissemination, participatory discussions were held with the people around the project area through focus group discussions (FGD) attended by stakeholders (ward councilors, local businessmen, laborers, landowners, women, and the general population). The project conducted 27 FGDs in November 2022 and December 2023 across all 27 wards (1-27), covering 373 participants (343 males and 30 females). During FGDs, it was revealed that participants were aware of the local area's drainage-related issues and supported the project. A resettlement information leaflet in the form of a public information brochure, both in English and Bangla, containing information on compensation, entitlement, and resettlement management adopted for the project, will be developed and distributed among the key stakeholders and will be made available in (i) the office of the NCC, and (ii) local ward-level offices. The draft resettlement plan will also be disclosed on the NCC and ADB websites. Consultations will be carried out throughout the project implementation period.

Grievance Redress Mechanism A common grievance redress mechanism (GRM) will be in place to receive, evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of social, environmental, or any other project-related grievances. The GRM will provide an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating the resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the project. The project will have a multi-tier GRM, each tier having time-bound schedules and with responsible persons identified to address grievances and seek appropriate persons' advice at each stage, as required. Public awareness campaigns will be conducted regularly to ensure awareness of the project,

including GRM. The campaign will ensure that the poor, vulnerable, and others are aware of and part of the project.

Implementation Arrangements The NCC is the executing agency for the Project and will be responsible for the management, coordination, and execution of all activities funded under the project. A dedicated project management unit (PMU) has been established within the NCC to implement the project components and is headed by a project director (superintendent engineer rank officer). The chief social welfare officer at PMU will be the nodal officer for social safeguards and gender and will be responsible for ensuring compliance with ADB's SPS, 2009, during the project implementation, including monitoring and reporting. The PMU will appoint a management, design, and supervision consultant (MDSC) to assist the PMU in the overall management and implementation of the NGRUDP.

Resettlement Budget and Financing Plan The estimated budget for the proposed projectproject resettlement plan is BDT 8.45 million. The budget includes resettlement assistance, as outlined in the entitlement matrix, support costs for resettlement plan implementation, and contingency. The NCC will be responsible for releasing the funds in a timely manner. All compensations, as outlined in the entitlement matrix, will be disbursed to the identified affected persons (as per the project cut-off date) prior to the commencement of any civil work.

Monitoring and reporting The implementation of the resettlement plan will be closely monitored to provide the NCC with an effective basis for assessing resettlement progress and identifying potential difficulties and problems. The monitoring will focus on (i) the shifting of mobile vendors to the new location and (ii) temporary impacts during shifting (the number of days for which compensation is paid versus the number of actual days of disruption of business). Since only temporary impacts are anticipated because of the project, the focus of monitoring will be on the number of days for which compensation is paid versus the number of actual days of disruption of business during construction. Unanticipated impacts and grievance redress will be monitored during construction, and corrective actions will be taken in accordance with the agreed entitlement matrix. With the support of MDSC, NCC will prepare monitoring reports and submit them to ADB semi-annually. Additionally, ADB will monitor projects continuously until a project completion report is issued.

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Project Background

1. ADB approved the Urban Infrastructure Improvement Preparatory Facility, a project readiness financing (PRF) loan for \$11 million, to strengthen Narayanganj City Corporation's (NCC) technical and implementation capacity to prepare the proposed project. The PRF supported the preparation of feasibility studies, detailed designs, draft bidding documents, and advance procurement for the Narayanganj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project (NGRUDP). The project intends to improve urban living conditions in Narayanganj City, adjacent to Dhaka. The project will (i) ensure long-term water security in selected zones in NCC areas by improving and expanding the water supply system, (ii) improve living conditions by developing or upgrading stormwater drainage systems in priority areas, and (iii) improve urban mobility by laying a riverside road within NCC with adjoining public spaces. This project will support infrastructure development in Narayanganj City by building upon infrastructure and capacity-building initiatives. The project will also support institutional strengthening of NCC in the optimal operation and maintenance of the project assets, in providing other basic urban services, and in the digitalization of administrative services. Narayanganj is the fourth most populated urban area in Bangladesh. The city is facing many challenges from unplanned and uncontrolled development.

2. The project has built-in components to ensure that infrastructure is climate resilient, designed with consideration for the poor, and promotes effective gender mainstreaming. The investment loan is consistent with the vision in Bangladesh's Eighth Five-Year Plan (2021–2025) to ensure access for all to adequate, safe, affordable drinking water and sanitation facilities and provide access to safe, accessible, and sustainable transport systems. The investment loan is aligned with the strategic objectives of the Asian Development Bank (ADB) country partnership strategy for Bangladesh (2021–2025) to promote green growth and climate resilience and to strengthen human capital. The NCC, under the Local Government Division of the Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives, will be the executing and implementing agency of the project.

3. The project is aligned with the following impacts: (i) sustainable and inclusive urban development achieved, and (ii) safe and climate-resilient delta area achieved. The project will have the following outcome: NCC's resilience and access to inclusive, reliable, and sustainable urban services improved.

4. **Output 1: Climate-resilient and inclusive infrastructure developed and/or improved.** The project will improve and expand the existing water supply system for inclusive, resilient, and safely managed continuous drinking water supply services in the priority areas in NCC to serve 0.6 million people. These will include rehabilitation of the existing WTP and 18 tube wells, replacement and expansion of the pipe network with DMA approaches to reduce nonrevenue water (NRW),² and installation of 20 new tube wells in selected areas for supply augmentation.³

² Improvements in the existing network with the DMA approach to reduce NRW will be a part of the long-term strategy to ensure judicious use of existing water supply and prepare for a larger investment in the future to switch from ground to surface water resources for more sustainability. The phased shift to surface water resources is based on DWASA's experience in similar projects funded by ADB. Digital applications such as smart water meters and SCADA will be introduced, and online billing and collection will be strengthened to augment revenue and improve efficiency.

The low-income communities (LICs) in the project area will be fully provided with a continuous water supply.⁴ The project will also establish and improve the stormwater drainage system in the priority areas to reduce waterlogging and flood risk with climate and disaster-resilient design and nature-based solutions such as introducing soil and vegetation. Further, the project will develop a total of 5 hectares of green public parks to improve the quality of life of the citizens, with features responsive to women and the vulnerable, to provide recreational spaces, and to reduce urban heat.

5. Output 2: Capacity and awareness of NCC and the local community in climate-resilient, sustainable, and inclusive urban services strengthened. To improve sustainability and quality of services through the facilities developed under output 1, the project will strengthen NCC staff capacity (including at least 90% of female staff) in climate-resilient, sustainable, and gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) responsive service delivery.⁵ It will develop service improvement plans including financial aspects for sustainable O&M. For water supply, NCC's capacity on O&M will be improved through on-the-job training by the contractor that will be responsible for O&M for the initial two years.⁶ DMA management and water quality monitoring will be supported.⁷ The project will also support preparation of masterplans for wastewater, solid waste management, and urban planning to improve living environment in an integrated manner, combined with the intervention under the project, and advance climate and disaster resilience. The project will also support GESI-sensitive community awareness and behavior change campaigns on water, sanitation and hygiene, climate resilience, and sustainable services to maximize the health and economic impact of the investments.⁸ This output, together with the infrastructure to be developed under the output 1, is expected to lead to achieving the intended outcome of improved resilience and access to inclusive, reliable and sustainable urban services.

6. Output 3. Institutional capacity and governance of other municipal services strengthened. The project will support a wide range of measures for municipal revenue augmentation, such as improvements in property tax, advertisement tax, and assets rents,⁹ as well as technical upgradation of the existing systems including tax database, collection mechanism, and other revenue administration system and a grievances redressal system. Further, to improve municipal services other than those supported under outputs 1 and 2, the project will also support capacity building of the NCC staff and elected representatives for governance improvements, including better transparency and monitoring mechanisms of municipal services involving citizen participation. It will build on NCC's successful past performance in governance improvement. The project will also strengthen NCC's administrative efficiency with a focus on a smoother citizen interface through digitalization of customer records, asset management, and procurement. This output is proposed to be funded by the attached TA

switching to surface water resources. During project preparation, a pilot intervention to establish two Water ATMs led by a social enterprise called Drinkwell has been implemented in NCC. and is expected to contribute to achieving the project outcome through consolidated financial, administrative, and governance strengthening.

B. Project Description

7. The existing drainage system in Narayanganj comprises 518 km of roadside drains, mainly of concrete rectangular cross-section. The system does not succeed in satisfactorily discharging storm flows, and flooding frequently occurs during the rainy season. In addition, several waterlogged areas exist within the city.

8. The project includes cleaning and pressure jetting the 151.021 km drainage network, constructing 21.49 km of new drainage system, and rehabilitating 19.923 km of existing drains within three drainage zones (zones 1,3 and 4). In addition, the existing main 13.69 km of *khals* (drains) will be relined and provided with walkways and green spaces. The component-wise details are provided in Table 1, zone-wise proposed drainage lengths are provided in Table 2, and drainage network zones are shown in Figure 1.



C. Profile of the Project Area

9. Narayanganj is the southeast gateway of Dhaka and one of the country's oldest industrial and trade centers, particularly for textile industries. Due to rapid population growth and urbanization, it became a city corporation from a pourashava¹⁰ in 2011, substantially increasing NCC's administrative responsibility for wider municipal services. However, the city suffers from haphazard infrastructure development and deficient urban basic services, which requires an integrated solution. The drainage network covers only half of the city area. Inadequate coverage and poorly maintained drainage are causing frequent water logging, especially during monsoon season, leading to unsanitary living conditions.

D. Measures to avoid and minimize the involuntary resettlement Impacts

10. Adequate measures have been taken during project preparation to minimize land acquisition and resettlement impacts within the alignment. For the construction of the drains, the NCC proposes to use the government-owned land and existing right of way (ROW) belonging to the government. It has been assessed that drainage works inside the carriageway will potentially require the temporary shifting of 223 roadside businesses (tea stalls, vegetable shop mobile hawkers, and those with movable structures). Temporarily affected mobile hawkers and vendors, including those with stalls and temporary structures, will be assisted by the project in moving to alternative locations to continue business during the construction period and will be allowed to return once construction in the area is declared complete. The businesses that need to move can return to their original location after completing the civil works.

11. During the execution of the civil works to avoid and minimize the resettlement impacts, the project will implement the following measures: (i) announcement of proposed civil works in advance; (ii) provide access to shops and residences or other buildings along alignments by providing wooden planks, and ramps with handrails (iii) increased workforces to finish work quickly in areas with impacts on access; (iv) phased construction schedule and working on one segment or one side of the road at a time; ensure management of traffic during the laying of the pipeline; (v) work to be carried out during non-business hours (generally after 11 pm and before 4 am and on market holidays) to the extent possible; (vi) maximize the use of precast materials in commercial areas and narrow roads, where possible; and (vi) assistance to mobile vendors, if any present during construction, to shift nearby.

E. Objective of the Resettlement Plan

12. This draft resettlement plan has been prepared to address the potential involuntary resettlement impacts due to the proposed project components for cleaning and rehabilitation of the existing drainage system and construction of new drains and is consistent with the entitlement matrix for the project prepared in accordance with the Government of Bangladesh's (GOB) Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property Act, 2017 (ARIPA) and ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement, (SPS) 2009 and to meet the following objectives:

- (i) to describe the identified scope and extent of land acquisition and involuntary resettlement impacts because of identified project components and address them through appropriate recommendations and mitigation measures in the resettlement plan;

- (ii) to present the socio-economic profile of the population in the project area, identify social impacts, including impacts on the poor and vulnerable, and the needs and priorities of different sections of the population, including women, poor and vulnerable;
- (iii) to describe the likely economic impacts and identified livelihood risks of the proposed project components;
- (iv) to describe the process undertaken during project design to engage stakeholders and the planned information disclosure measures, and the process for carrying out consultation with affected people and facilitating their participation during project implementation;
- (v) to establish a framework for grievance redress for affected persons that is appropriate to the local context in consultation with stakeholders;
- (vi) to describe the applicable national and local legal framework for the project and define the involuntary resettlement policy principles applicable to the project;
- (vii) to define entitlements of affected persons and assistance and benefits available under the project;
- (viii) to present a budget for resettlement and define institutional arrangements, implementation responsibilities and implementation schedule for resettlement implementation; and
- (ix) to describe the monitoring mechanism that will be used to monitor the resettlement plan implementation

II. SCOPE OF LAND ACQUISITION AND INVOLUNTARY RESETTLEMENT

A. Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement

13. The project will not entail any land acquisition or permanent involuntary resettlement impact. The project components in three zones are proposed to be constructed within the government-owned vacant land free from all encumbrances and within the existing rights of way (ROW) of roads and drains belonging to the government. The land is in possession of the NCC. The land acquisition and resettlement scope has been established based on field visits to the proposed drain reconstruction/ rehabilitation locations. The draft resettlement plan has been prepared based on an inventory of loss, a 100 % socioeconomic/ census survey conducted in Zone 1, and a transit walk in other zones (3 and 4). Proposed interventions and their potential involuntary resettlement impacts are limited to a temporary income loss along the drain alignment during the construction period and the impact on access ramps and cement concrete flooring constructed upon the encroached area, which the contractor will reconstruct.

14. The drains will be constructed within the available government right of way (ROW); however, some sections of drains will pass through the congested commercial and residential area, which will cause a temporary loss of income due to restricted access arising out of the excavation of trenches for reconstruction/rehabilitation and dredging to 223 non-titled road-side businesses (vendors, hawkers). The construction of new and rehabilitation of the existing drains will cause a temporary impact on 223 non-titled businesses in Zone 1, while no livelihood impacts are envisaged in Zone 3 and 4 as the drains will be constructed and rehabilitated majorly within the residential areas. In addition, the project will also result in loss of access to nine common property resources (CPR). The zone-wise estimated impacts are provided in Table 3. The vendors will be given an alternate place to operate during civil works and allowed to return to their original place once the civil works are over. The affected persons will be paid for loss of income for four days, two days to shift from their current location and set up their business nearby, and two days again when they return. For those whose access will be disrupted, the continuance of business will be ensured by providing temporary access, and then loss of income will not be required to be paid.

15. The summary of involuntary resettlement impacts, which includes temporary economic impacts due to loss of access, loss of access to CPRs, and details of the vulnerable people in all three zones, is presented in Table 4. Involuntary resettlement impacts will be further assessed and reconfirmed after the finalization of detailed design and alignments through detailed measurement surveys (DMS) on sites/ sections of road and drainage alignments, ready for construction, and the resettlement plan will be updated accordingly before contract award. The socio-economic details, including photographs of each affected person with vulnerability status, have been presented in **Appendix 1**. None of the affected persons will be permanently displaced from their present location during project work.

16. The construction work will be done within the right of way (ROW). The existing main *khals* will be relined and provided with walkways and green spaces. The project will make efforts to avoid livelihood impacts to minimize the temporary impacts to the extent possible through the following actions: (i) announcement of proposed civil works in advance; (ii) providing safe spaces for access over the tranches; (iii) provide access to shops and residences or other buildings along alignments by providing wooden planks, metal sheets and ramps with handrails; (iv) increased workforces to finish work quickly in areas with impacts on access; (v) phased construction schedule and working on one segment or one side of the road at a time; ensure management of traffic during the laying of the pipeline; (vi) work to be carried out during non-business hours (generally after 11 pm and before 4 am and on market holidays) to the extent possible; (vii) maximize the use of precast materials in commercial areas and narrow roads, where possible; and (viii) assistance to mobile vendors, if any present during construction, to shift nearby.

B. Tribes, Minor Races, Ethnic Sects, and Communities

17. Based on the Population and Housing Census 2011, Narayanganj district as a whole has 183 households belonging to TMRESC, which cover 0.03% of the total households of the district.¹³ No direct or indirect impacts to the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems or territories, or natural or cultural resources that are used, owned, occupied, or claimed by TMRESC population/indigenous peoples as their ancestral domain or asset, is anticipated. The surveys have not revealed the presence of any TMRESC population living within the proposed project area. The NGRUDP is classified as category C for indigenous people as per the ADB's SPS, 2009.

C. Common Property Resources

18. Temporary loss of access to nine CPRs is anticipated during the construction phase. The contractor will ensure suitable and safe access, especially in the case of schools and colleges, by installing the wooden planks, ramps with handrails during construction, and restoration of access to its original or better condition after completion of the civil works. Table 5 provides the details of the CPRs to which access loss is envisaged.

III. SOCIO-ECONOMIC INFORMATION AND PROFILE

A. Profile of Affected Persons

19. The profile of the affected persons likely to be affected by the project is based on walk-through socio-economic surveys along Zone 1 and transact walks in Zones 3 and 4. The survey provides information on the socio-economic conditions of affected households identified during the survey. The vendors and roadside shops may have a temporary impact on their livelihood due to access disruption during construction of the drain; however, no impact on their structures is anticipated. A wide range of data, including social category, type of losses, type of occupation, and sources of income, have been collected for social-economic profiling of the affected person and have been provided below.

1. Demography

20. The survey indicated 223 non-titled households with a total population of 860 persons will be impacted. The average household size for the surveyed population is 3.84. The details are given in Table 6.

2. Distribution of Affected Persons by Age and Sex

21. Of the 869 affected people, 469 (54.17 %) are male, while 391 (45.83 %) are females. The national sex ratio is 98.04¹⁴ (2022). Children in the age group of 0-9 years account for 13.02 % of the affected population. The age group of 20-39 years accounted for the largest group, accounting for 34.77 % of the affected population. The largest number (61.98 %) was between the age group of 20 to 64. The male-female percentages in the age groups 10-19, 20-39, and 40-54 are almost similar, showing marginal differences. Table 7 provides the age and sex distribution of the affected population.

3. Distribution of Affected Persons by Religion

23. Based on the census survey, 68 (8.82%) persons were illiterate, while 334 (43.32%) persons completed primary education. Of the affected persons, only 20 (2.59%) were graduates, of which there were only four female graduates. Table 9 provides the education status of the affected persons.

5. Distribution of Affected Businesses by Type of Asset

24. The type of asset which is mainly used for carrying out business is display tables. These are tables/benches on which goods /items to be sold are displayed. This accounts for 73.09 % of all the total assets, followed by pushcarts, which account for 21.08 %. All the businesses with display tables, pushcarts, baskets, and structures with tin roofs on poles can be easily moved to a nearby location where the affected persons can continue their business. Table 10 provides the distribution of assets owned to carry out business.

6. Nature of Business (Occupation)

25. The survey revealed that 22.87 % of the affected businesses are involved in selling clothes, 10.76 % are running tea stalls, 9.87% are involved in selling food items, while the remaining are involved in different businesses like selling cosmetics, jewelry, electronic items, mobile accessories, crockery, leather items, etc. Table 11 details all the types of business carried out by the affected population.

7. Daily Net Income

26. The daily net income reported ranges from BDT 200 to 1500, while most affected persons (90.14%) earn between BDT 500 and 800. Table 12 shows the approximate daily net income reported by the respondents. The average daily net income is 640 BDT.

8. Employees

27. None of the surveyed businesses have hired any employees.

9. Vulnerability

28. As per the entitlement matrix, the following population groups are considered vulnerable and thus need special consideration. They include (i) woman-headed households, (ii) households having a person with disability, (iii) households belonging to tribes, minor races and ethnic sects, (iv) elderly-headed households, (v) children including orphans, child workers, (vi) below poverty line households, (vii) *Shudra/Rabidas/Harijan* castes, (viii) landless households and (ix) those without legal title. Based on the survey, all 223 affected households belong to the non-titled category and are hence considered vulnerable.

10. Common Property Resources

29. During the construction stage, nine CPRs will temporarily lose access. The contractor will ensure suitable and safe access, especially in the case of schools and colleges, by providing wooden planks, metal sheets/ ramps with handrails to all the CPRs during construction and reconstructing them to their original conditions after the civil works are completed. Table 13 provides the details of CPRs losing access.

IV. CONSULTATION, PARTICIPATION AND DISCLOSURE

A. Consultation and Participation Process

30. The resettlement plan was prepared in consultation with the affected persons and key stakeholders. The objective of the consultation meetings was to inform and get feedback from the affected population and the community/ residents of NCC regarding the proposed interventions. The key stakeholders consulted during resettlement plan preparation include (i) affected persons, including vulnerable households, (ii) program beneficiaries, (iii) elected representatives, (iv) ward-level committees, and (v) local government and relevant government agencies representatives.

31. The participants were already aware of the project and expressed their willingness to provide support during the execution of the work. During the meeting, the stakeholders were briefed about the technical details of the project and implementation schedule, project benefits and adverse impacts envisaged during construction, environmental and social safeguards, gender inclusion, community participation aspects built into the project, etc. Issues like the extent of the project and development components, benefits of the project, traffic disruptions, and impacts on livelihood were discussed in detail with the stakeholders. There was no opposition to the proposed projects as the work would benefit the local population.

32. During the project preparation, 27 focus group discussions (FGD) were carried out in November 2022 and November 2023 across Narayanganj, covering 373 participants (343 males and 30 females). The summary of the FGDs conducted are provided in Table 14. The summary outcomes of consultations are provided in Table 15, and the minutes of the meetings, photographs, and attendance sheets are attached as **Appendix 2**.

Most respondents stated that their earnings had been reduced because of the frequent flooding in the drainage systems in their locations and that they faced various health and financial challenges due to poor drainage conditions.</p> <p>Willingness to contribute/cooperate: The participants were very receptive to the project. The participants supported NCC's plan regarding the waterlogged and inadequate drains and said the drainage project would improve the town's environmental living conditions and public health. In addition, the project will lead towards (i) reduction of household healthcare costs due to flooding and water logging problems, (ii) reduction in person-days lost due to water logging and flooding, and (iii) ensuring livelihoods are not disrupted due to flooding. The participants thanked the government and NCC for making relevant plans to ensure fully functional and adequate drains in every ward. 33. Further consultations with various stakeholders will be carried out throughout the project cycle. The PMU will conduct the consultations with the support of the MDSC. Consultation is a continuous process and will be conducted at several levels during resettlement plan implementation that includes (i) heads of households/members likely to be impacted, (ii) ward-level members, and (iii) community-based organizations (CBO and (iv) separate consultations with women . The consultation will involve (i) dissemination of information on the resettlement plan, including entitlements; this will involve explaining the entitlement matrix and resettlement process to the affected persons and soliciting their support and cooperation; (ii) dissemination of information on the temporary relocation site during construction; (iii) dissemination of information on likely date of shifting, etc.

34. Particular attention will be paid to the needs of the vulnerable groups. The PMU will ensure that any views of the affected persons, particularly vulnerable people, related to the shifting process are looked into and addressed. The PMU will ensure that groups and individuals consulted are informed about the outcome of the decision-making process and confirm how their views were incorporated. Women's participation will be ensured by involving them in public consultation at various stages of project preparation. The venue and the time of meetings will be convenient for women.

B. Information Disclosure

35. This draft and the updated resettlement plan will be duly uploaded to ADB and project websites. Before implementing the project, the draft resettlement plan will be updated based on the final design, and a 100% socio-economic survey of the affected households will be conducted. The draft and final resettlement plan will be duly disclosed to project affected persons and will be available at (i) the NCC office and (ii) local-level ward offices. During the project implementation, construction schedules will be informed to all residents (including affected persons) through signboards before the commencement of pipe laying. The signboards will be in the local language and will include, at a minimum, (i) the section to be affected, (ii) start and end dates, (iii) information on traffic rerouting, if any, and (iv) contact information for questions/grievances.

36. A resettlement information leaflet in the form of a public information disclosure brochure (PID), both in English and Bangla, containing information on compensation, entitlement, and resettlement management adopted for the project, will be developed and distributed among the key stakeholders. The PID will include the following information: (i) a brief background of the project (ii) resettlement impacts; (iii) the entitlements due to the affected persons; (v) timing of payments; (vi) the schedule of displacement; (vii) grievance redress mechanism; and (viii) contact persons at NCC. The template for the PID is given in **Appendix 6**. Information dissemination and consultation will continue throughout the project cycle.

C. Consultation and Participation Plan

37. A consultation and participation plan will be prepared for the project. A program of continuous consultation is proposed. The primary purpose of the consultation and participation plan is to disseminate information and to open up the lines of communication between the NCC and all stakeholders to facilitate the implementation of the project and the early resolution of any conflict issues that may arise. The consultation and participation plan will include the communication processes and activities that will take place throughout the project. Community mobilisers at MDSC will be trained and responsible for consultations throughout the project period.

V. GRIEVANCE REDRESS MECHANISM

38. A project specific GRM will be established to receive, evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of affected persons' concerns, complaints, and grievances about social and environmental performance at the project level. The GRM will aim to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns associated with the Project.

39. A common GRM will be in place for social, environmental, or any other grievances related to the Project. The GRM will provide an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating the resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the investment program. The multi-tier GRM for the Project is outlined below, with each tier having time-bound schedules and responsible persons identified to address grievances and seek appropriate persons' advice at each stage, as required.

40. The Project area-wide public awareness campaigns will ensure that knowledge of the grievance redress procedures is generated. The PMU will conduct awareness campaigns to ensure that all affected persons and vulnerable households are made aware of grievance redress procedures and entitlements. Contractors will provide pamphlets to communities before starting work, and billboards will be installed during construction. The pamphlets and billboards will include relevant environmental and social safeguards, GRM information, and contact details of key personnel from PMU, MDSC, and contractors.

41. Affected persons will have the flexibility of conveying grievances/suggestions by dropping grievance redress/suggestion forms in complaints/suggestion boxes to be installed by PMU. Grievances can be sent by post, e-mail, and by writing in the complaints register in the PMU office. The project will also have an option of registering complaints/grievances through NCC website. Careful documentation of the name of the complainant, date of receipt of the complaint, address/contact details of the person, location of the problem area, and how the problem was resolved will be undertaken. The PMU social and environmental officers will be responsible for timely grievance redress on environmental and social safeguards issues and for registration of grievances, related disclosure, and communication with the aggrieved party. A copy of a proposed outline of a grievance registration form is given in Appendix 3. All the documents made available to the public will include information on the contact number, address, and contact person for registering grievances and will be disseminated throughout the project area by the PMU.

A. Existing Grievance Mechanism

42. The current methods of registering complaints include complaint registration at the Office of the Executive Engineer at the Godnail water treatment plant or the office of the concerned elected representatives (ward councilors and the mayor). The complaints are filed through e-mails, phone calls, WhatsApp messages, etc. The complaint-receiving person sends these grievances to the NCC's concerned officer/department for resolution. More significant issues are resolved in consultation with the mayor of NCC. The existing grievance redress process is currently not formalized.


B. Proposed Grievance Redress Mechanism under Narayananj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project

43. The existing NCC grievance redress processes will be integrated into the proposed project-specific grievance redress mechanism established for the Project. The NCC will establish the grievance redress committees (GRC) at the local, Project, and apex levels to provide a

mechanism to mediate conflict and disputes concerning compensation payments and cut down on lengthy litigation. The contact numbers and names of the concerned staff and contractors will be posted at all construction sites in visible locations. The proposed grievance redress mechanism for the Project is given below.

- (i) **Local level (first level):** The on-site contractor's safeguards (social and environment) Officer/ Assistant Engineer of the PMU/ social and environment officer, NCC, will receive and record the complaint at the projectproject site. Alternatively, the complaint can be registered by phone call, e-mail, or on the NC website, and this will be forwarded to the on-site personnel for first-level resolution. The complaint will be reviewed by the local level GRC comprising of (i) Deputy Project Director, NCC, who will be the convener; other members include social and environment officer, NCC; (iii) Councilor- reserved seat; (iv) Councilor- concerned ward; (v) GRM Focal (Chief Social Welfare Officer); (vi) Assistant Engineer NCC (designated as member secretary); and (iv) Resettlement/ Environment Specialist of the MDSC. The contractor's site engineer and EHS (Environment Health and Safety) cum social supervisor will jointly support in meetings, consultations, and site-level grievance resolution. The effort will be made to resolve issues on-site, in consultation with each other, and within seven days of receipt of a complaint/grievance.
- (ii) **Project level (second level):** All grievances that cannot be redressed within seven days at the local level will be brought to the notice of the Project level GRC, comprising of the Project Director who will be the convener; other members include the Deputy Project Director (sectoral); Social Safeguards Officer (PMU); Environment Safeguards Officer (PMU); Team Leader, MDSC (designated as member secretary) and Social and Environment Specialist, MDSC. The Project level GRC will resolve the grievance within 14 days (about 2 weeks) of receipt of a complaint/ grievance, and
- (iii) **Apex level (third level):** If the grievance is not resolved at the Project level, the grievance will be referred to the Apex level, headed by the Honorable Mayor. The chief executive officer will support the grievance process. Other members include the Project Director, who will be the member secretary and NCC GRM focal officer. The grievance at this level will be resolved within 21 days (about 3 weeks) of receipt.

44. A representative of affected persons from each settlement will be a special invitee to the GRC meetings whenever required. If any grievance requires immediate and urgent attention, the Assistant Engineer/ Contractors safeguard personnel and social and environments officers and experts of PMU and MDSC will ensure the grievance is jointly and quickly responded to. Despite the Project GRM, an aggrieved person shall have access to the country's legal system at any stage. This can run parallel to accessing the GRM and is not dependent on the negative outcome of the GRM. The grievance redress process is explained in Figure 2.

45. **ADB's Accountability Mechanism.** The accountability mechanism provides an independent forum and process whereby people adversely affected by ADB-assisted projects can voice and seek a resolution to their problems and report alleged violations of ADB's operational policies and procedures. If the established GRM cannot resolve the issue, the affected person can use the ADB Accountability Mechanism by directly contacting (in writing) the Complaint Receiving Officer. Before submitting a complaint to the Accountability Mechanism, it is recommended that affected people make a good-faith effort to resolve their problems by working with the concerned ADB operations department (in this case, ADB Bangladesh Resident Mission). Only after doing that, and if they are still dissatisfied, should they approach the Accountability Mechanism.

46. **Documentation.** PMU will be responsible for the timely registration of grievances, related disclosure, and communication with the aggrieved party. PMU will also ensure that all the details from submission to resolution are well recorded and documented.

47. **Record-keeping.** The PMU will keep records of grievances received, including contact details of the complainant, the date the complaint was received, the nature of the grievance, agreed corrective actions, the date these were affected, and the final outcome. The number of grievances recorded and resolved, and the outcomes will be available in the PMU office and reported in monitoring reports submitted to ADB on a semi-annual basis. All resolutions shall be communicated to the aggrieved party/complainant(s).

48. **Periodic review and documentation of lessons learned.** The PMU will periodically review the functioning of the GRM and record information on the effectiveness of the mechanism, especially on the program's ability to prevent and address grievances.

49. **Costs.** All costs related to resolving grievances (meetings, consultations, communication, and reporting/ information dissemination, as well as costs incurred by affected persons to attend GRC meetings, if any) will be borne by Project.

VI. LEGAL FRAMEWORK

50. The legal framework for the project is based on applicable legal and policy frameworks of the Government of Bangladesh (GoB), namely the Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property Act 2017 and ADB's Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS), 2009. The GoB does not have any specific policy for addressing involuntary resettlement nor do they have any street vendors act or any other policy applicable to roadside businesses. .

A. Government of Bangladesh Laws and Policies

51. The principal legal instrument for governing land acquisition in Bangladesh is the Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property (ARIPA) Act 2017, which requires that compensation be paid for (i) land and assets permanently acquired (including land with 200 percent premium, structures (houses and business, trees and standing crops with 100 percent premium); (ii) any other impact caused by such acquisition. The Act provides certain safeguards for the owners and has provision for payment of "fair value" for the property acquired.

52. Under the Act, the government has an obligation to provide compensation only for the land/assets acquired. Further, The Act does not deal with social and economic impacts due to land acquisition. For instance, the Act does not cover project-displaced persons without titles, such as informal settlers (squatters), occupiers, and informal tenants and leaseholders (without registration documents). Further, the Act has no provision for resettlement of affected households and business or any assistance for restoration of livelihoods of the displaced persons.

B. ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement, 2009

53. The ADB's Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS), 2009 recognizes and addresses involuntary resettlement impacts and requires the preparation of a resettlement plan in every instance where involuntary resettlement occurs. The ADB policy requirements are:

- (i) Avoid or minimize impacts where possible;
- (ii) Consultation with the displaced persons in project planning and implementation;
- (iii) Payments of compensation for acquired assets at the replacement cost;
- (iv) Ensure that no one is worse off as a result of resettlement and would maintain at least their original standard of living;
- (v) Resettlement assistance to displaced persons, including non-titled persons; and
- (vi) Special attention to vulnerable people/groups.

54. For any ADB operation requiring involuntary resettlement, resettlement planning is an integral part of project design, to be dealt with from the earliest stages of the project cycle. The main policy principles of the SPS, 2009 are:

- (i) Screen the project early on to identify past, present, and future involuntary resettlement impacts and risks. Determine the scope of resettlement planning through a survey and/or census of displaced persons, including a gender analysis, specifically related to resettlement impacts and risks;
- (ii) Carry out meaningful consultations with displaced persons, host communities, and concerned NGOs. Inform all displaced persons of their entitlements and resettlement options. Ensure their participation in planning, implementation, and monitoring and evaluation of resettlement programs. Pay particular attention to the needs of vulnerable groups, especially those below the poverty line, the landless,

the elderly, women and children, and Indigenous Peoples, and landless (those without legal title to land), and ensure their participation in consultations. Establish a grievance redress mechanism to receive and facilitate resolution of the displaced persons' concerns. Support the social and cultural institutions of displaced persons and their host population. Where involuntary resettlement impacts and risks are highly complex and sensitive, compensation and resettlement decisions should be preceded by a social preparation phase;

- (iii) Improve, or at least restore, the livelihoods of all displaced persons through: (a) land-based resettlement strategies when affected livelihoods are land-based where possible or cash compensation at replacement value for land when the loss of land does not undermine livelihoods; (b) prompt replacement of assets with access to assets of equal or higher value; (c) prompt compensation at full replacement cost for assets that cannot be restored; and (d) additional revenues and services through benefit sharing schemes where possible;
- (iv) Provide physically and economically displaced persons with needed assistance, including: (a) if there is relocation, secured tenure to relocation land, better housing at resettlement sites with comparable access to employment and production opportunities, integration of resettled persons economically and socially into their host communities and extension of project benefits to host communities; (b) transitional support and development assistance, such as land development, credit facilities, training, or employment opportunities; and (c) civic infrastructure and community services, as required;
- (v) Improve the standards of living of the displaced poor and other vulnerable groups, including women, to at least national minimum standards. In rural areas provide them with legal and affordable access to land and resources and in urban areas provide them with appropriate income sources and legal and affordable access to adequate housing;
- (vi) Develop procedures in a transparent, consistent, and equitable manner if land acquisition is through negotiated settlement to ensure that those people who enter into negotiated settlements will maintain the same or better income and livelihood status;
- (vii) Ensure that displaced persons without titles to land or any recognizable legal rights to land are eligible for resettlement assistance and compensation for loss of non-land assets;
- (viii) Prepare a resettlement plan elaborating on displaced persons' entitlements, the income and livelihood restoration strategy, institutional arrangements, monitoring and reporting framework, budget, and time-bound implementation schedule;
- (ix) Disclose a draft resettlement plan, including documentation of the consultation process in a timely manner, before project appraisal, in an accessible place and a form and language(s) understandable to displaced persons and other stakeholders. Disclose the final resettlement plan and its updates to displaced persons and other stakeholders;
- (x) Conceive and execute involuntary resettlement as part of a development project or program. Include the full costs of resettlement in the presentation of project's costs and benefits. For a project with significant involuntary resettlement impacts, consider implementing the involuntary resettlement component of the project as a stand-alone operation;
- (xi) Pay compensation and provide other resettlement entitlements before physical or economic displacement. Implement the resettlement plan under close supervision throughout project implementation; and

- (xii) Monitor and assess resettlement outcomes, their impacts on the standards of living of displaced persons, and whether the objectives of the resettlement plan have been achieved by taking into account the baseline conditions and the results of resettlement monitoring. Disclose monitoring reports.

55. A comparison of the key provisions of Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property (ARIPA) Act 2017 and ADB's SPS, 2009 and gap filling measures is presented in **Appendix 4**. The project will follow the involuntary resettlement policy principles and the entitlement matrix to ensure that the gaps between the ADB's SPS requirements and the Government of Bangladesh's laws are complied with. Bangladesh does not have any policy to cover impacts to non-titled businesses occupying government-owned rights of way. This is a gap against ADB policy which provides for compensation at replacement cost to all affected persons, irrespective of their legal status.

VII. ENTITLEMENTS, ASSISTANCE AND BENEFITS

A. Type of Losses and Affected Person Category

56. The anticipated losses due to the proposed project include temporary income loss to businesses/ mobile vendors along the road margin and impact to structures such as ramps due to excavation of trench for laying of drainage lines and associated civil works.

57. In accordance with the involuntary resettlement principles adopted for this project, the affected persons falling in any of the following two categories will be eligible for compensation and resettlement assistance: (i) those who have formal legal rights to land lost in its entirety or in part; and (ii) those who lost the land they occupy in its entirety or in part and have neither formal legal rights nor recognized or recognizable claims to such land.

58. Inventory of loss surveys were conducted in December 2022 and August 2023 based on the preliminary designs. Through these surveys, the project has identified shops/ vendors that will likely face temporary disruption and will make necessary provisions during civil works to continue access without disrupting their activity. Wherever avoidance and mitigation measures are not possible, the PMU will provide compensation and assistance to the affected persons in line with the agreed provisions in the entitlement matrix for temporary impacts and impacts during civil works.

B. Entitlements

59. The entitlement matrix summarizes the types of possible losses and corresponding entitlements in accordance with ADB and government policies for temporary income loss during civil works. No relocation impact is anticipated in this project. The proposed entitlement matrix for the project is given in Table 16.

VIII. RESETTLEMENT BUDGET

A. Loss of Livelihood

60. The project will mitigate temporary disruption to businesses/ mobile vendors during the trench excavation for laying drainage lines and associated civil works by providing temporary access or alternate space for mobile vendors who can relocate to an adjacent place to continue the business. In case both are not possible, cash assistance for loss of income will be calculated for an actual number of days of livelihood disruption, or if income loss cannot be assessed due to the non-availability of the documents, cash assistance will be based on minimum wages for the duration of an actual number of days of livelihood disruption. The project entitlements for temporary loss of livelihood include:

- (i) **Income Loss:** Cash compensation equivalent to net income from the affected business for the period of disruption on producing relevant income or income tax return documents; in the absence of proper income documents, the income will be calculated based on information provided during the socio-economic survey. The estimated average daily income is BDT 2000. The income loss will be calculated based on actual days of work. For budgeting, four days have been considered (two days during shifting to an alternate location and two days during return to the original location).
- (ii) **Shifting Assistance:** This has been considered for all affected persons. A uniform amount of 3000 BDT is proposed as one-time shifting allowance.
- (iii) **Additional Support to Vulnerable:** Vulnerable households who lose income will be (i) provided preferential employment in the project construction, and (ii) One-time cash compensation of BDT 10,000 to the affected vulnerable household.

61. The resettlement cost estimate includes assistance for temporary income loss to shops / mobile vendors along the road/drain margins that may be required to be paid if such impacts cannot be mitigated during civil works by providing temporary access, consultation, grievance redressal, and awareness generation cost. The budget also covers shifting vendors to another location and returning to their original location. The government will provide an adequate budget for all expenses related to the implementation of the resettlement plan. The estimated total resettlement cost for the project is BDT 9.95 million. A detailed budget estimate is given in Table 17.

^a Provisional sums for temporary income loss assistance are provided for, in the event that such impacts cannot be avoided during implementation. If avoided/mitigated through the provision of alternate space to continue the business and ensuring they do not suffer even partial loss of income, these amounts need not be spent. The basis for the estimated unit rate (average daily income is estimated at BDT 2000) is as per the information collected during census surveys in December 2022 and August 2023. These estimates are only for budgetary purposes. During implementation, the PMU, with the support of MDSC, will assess the duration of loss of income and quantum of income loss on a case-to-case basis and will provide assistance for loss of income.

All 223 affected households are considered as nontitleholders and vulnerable. These estimates are only for budgetary purposes. During DMS and census surveys, the PMU, with the support of MDSC, will re-verify the affected persons and their vulnerability.

The restoration cost of affected ramps and cement concrete flooring is included in the contractor's scope; hence, no separate budgetary provisions are made in this resettlement plan.

Three structures (kutchra and tin roof with poles) may be affected. The cost of this can be covered by contractor or under contingency provision.

The contractor is liable to restore the damaged structure to its original condition, if not restored, the contractor shall pay the replacement cost without depreciation for any damages to assets/trees/crops in private/public land caused due to civil works.

IX. INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

62. **Project Management Unit.** The NCC is the executing agency for the Project. A dedicated project management unit (PMU) has been established within the NCC. The PMU, headed by a project director (superintendent engineer rank officer), is responsible for overall project management, and is supported by three deputy project directors (executive engineer rank) and a chief social welfare officer.

63. The chief social welfare officer at PMU will be the nodal officer for social safeguards and gender and will be responsible for ensuring compliance with ADB's Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS), 2009, during the project implementation, including the monitoring and reporting. A qualified and experienced individual consultant designated as a social safeguards and gender officer will support the chief social welfare officer, who will be recruited from the open market and with relevant background (educational and professional). The following will be the social safeguards-related responsibilities of PMU:

- (i) Conduct screening of the project components for past, present, and future involuntary resettlement impacts and risks;
- (ii) Provide support to design the Project to avoid or minimize involuntary resettlement impacts;
- (iii) Liaise with district administration to obtain the land documents, ensure land availability and transfer of land, and the issuance of no objection certificates (as and when required) for all the projects;
- (iv) Ensure compliance with all national laws, rules, and regulations regarding land acquisition, land transfer, and issuance of no objection certificates;

- (v) Undertake the review of resettlement plans and DDRs prepared by the management, design, and supervision consultant (MDSC) and confirm compliance with ADB's requirements;
- (vi) Ensure that resettlement plans and DDRs are included in the bidding documents and civil works contracts;
- (vii) Ensure implementation of agreed safeguards documents;
- (viii) Conduct detailed measurement and verification surveys of affected persons, prepare a list of affected persons, and provide all data required to prepare/update resettlement plans and DDRs with support from the individual social safeguards consultant of PMU and safeguards specialist of MDSC;
- (ix) issue advance notices to all the stakeholders, including affected persons, informing them about the tentative schedule of works along with entitlement matrix and compensation packages and cut-off date;
- (x) Ensure availability of budget for resettlement and rehabilitation activities;
- (xi) Provide support to MDSC in preparation of the micro plans and ensure timely distribution of the compensation as per the agreed entitlement matrix;
- (xii) Ensure temporarily displaced persons (shops/vendors) are provided space to continue their business activities during construction and ensure these affected establishments can return to their original location after construction;
- (xiii) Ensure the contractors comply with the agreed resettlement plans and DDRs;
- (xiv) Ensuring adequate awareness campaigns are held throughout the project area, with a focus on vulnerable groups;
- (xv) Ensure timely disclosure of resettlement plans and DDRs at locations and form accessible to all the stakeholders, including the affected persons;
- (xvi) Collect the social safeguard monitoring information, prepare and ensure submission of the semi-annual social safeguard monitoring reports to ADB regularly up to issuance of project completion report;
- (xvii) Take proactive measures to address grievances promptly brought in through the grievance redress mechanism;
- (xviii) Organize/conduct periodic orientation programs to train project staff, consultants, and contractors, social safeguard and gender requirements related to mitigation measures; and
- (xix) Undertake immediate actions to resolve the unexpected adverse impacts identified during the execution of the Project.

64. **Management, design, and supervision consultant.** The Project will hire the services of MDSC to support PMU in the implementation and ensure compliance with the social safeguards' requirements. MDSC will mobilize international and national social safeguards specialists (on an intermittent basis), a community development officer, and three community mobilizers. The detailed social safeguards-related responsibilities of MDSC will include, but are not limited to, the following:


- (i) Ensure that resettlement plans and DDRs are prepared and updated promptly;
- (ii) Provide support to PMU in liaisoning with district administration to obtain the land documents, issuance of no objection certificates, and transfer of land (as and when required);
- (iii) Develop systems to monitor social safeguards and gender outcomes of the Project, including the functioning of the GRM, and prepare indicators for monitoring safeguards and gender parameters;

- (iv) Support the PMU in ensuring that the social safeguard and activities are carried out in accordance with government policy, agreed plans and in compliance with the SPS 2009;
- (v) Support the PMU in conducting the detailed measurement and verification surveys of affected persons, prepare a list of affected persons, provide all data required to prepare/update resettlement plans and DDRs,
- (vi) Prepare the micro plans and ensure timely distribution of the compensation as per the agreed entitlement matrix;
- (vii) Provide the support to address grievances promptly brought in through the grievance redress mechanism;
- (viii) Ensure that the relevant measures related to social safeguards specified in the resettlement plans and DDRs are incorporated in bidding documents and monitor their compliance on behalf of PMU/PIUs;
- (ix) Ensure monitoring of social safeguards plans and identify and address unanticipated impacts, if any;
- (x) Conduct regular consultations with all the stakeholders, including the affected persons;
- (xi) Support the PMU in ensuring temporarily displaced persons (shops/vendors) are provided space to continue their business activities during construction and ensure these affected establishments return to their original location after construction;
- (xii) Prepare semi-annual social safeguards monitoring reports and submit them to ADB through PMU and
- (xiii) Conduct regular orientation programs to train project staff, consultants, and contractors, as well as social safeguard and gender requirements related to mitigation measures.

65. **Contractor.** The contractor will hire a dedicated EHS cum social supervisor within one month of mobilization who will ensure the following tasks.

- (i) Work in close coordination with the social safeguards staff of the PMU and MDSC to finalize the detailed design, keeping in view the safeguard principles adopted for the Project;
- (ii) Conduct detailed measurement surveys (DMS) jointly with PMU and MDSC at sites/sections ready for implementation to arrive at the final inventory of loss;
- (iii) Make efforts to avoid or mitigate the resettlement impacts through the design considerations in discussion with safeguards staff of PMU and MDSC;
- (iv) Ensure that no civil works are initiated in the stretch where there are affected persons without payment of compensation;
- (v) Assist with grievance redress and ensure recording, reporting, and follow-up for resolution of all grievances received;
- (vi) Understand the regulatory compliance requirements related to labor welfare, environmental and social safeguards, and occupational health and safety;
- (vii) Assist PMU in disclosing relevant information on safeguards (eligibility, entitlements, compensation, cut-off date, processes, timelines, GRM) to all the stakeholders, including affected persons.

A. Safeguards Capacity Development

67. The international social safeguards specialist at MDSC will be responsible for conducting periodic capacity building and training workshops on ADB's safeguards requirements for staff of NCC and contractors. During the implementation of the program, the safeguards-related training needs assessment would be conducted by the MDSC to develop the training schedule. The safeguards-related training modules include grievance redress mechanism (GRM) and problem-solving techniques. The capacity building and training workshops will cover the following aspects but will not be limited to:

X. IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

68. The project will be implemented in line with the ADB’s safeguard requirements and principles laid down in this resettlement plan. The implementation agency will ensure that project activities are synchronized between the resettlement plan implementation activities and the project civil works. The implementation of the resettlement plan will include (i) identification of cut-off date and notification, (ii) verification of losses and extent of impacts, (iii) finalization of entitlements and distribution of identity cards, (iv) consultations with affected persons on their needs and priorities, and (v) resettlement, provision of compensation and assistance to affected persons. The implementation agency will ensure that no physical or economic displacement of affected persons takes place until (i) compensation and assistance as per the entitlement matrix have been paid to each affected person and (iii) support is provided to those whose livelihoods are impacted to shift to another nearby location. However, public consultation and monitoring will be continued on an intermittent basis during the entire duration of the project. A tentative implementation schedule is provided in Table 19.

XI. MONITORING AND REPORTING

69. Monitoring and reporting are critical activities in involuntary resettlement to ameliorate problems the affected persons face and develop solutions immediately. The implementation of the resettlement plan will be closely monitored to provide the PMU with assistance from MDSC. Monitoring will involve (i) administrative monitoring to ensure that implementation is on schedule and problems are dealt with on a timely basis; (ii) socio-economic monitoring during and after any resettlement impact utilizing baseline information established through the socio-economic survey of affected persons undertaken during project sub-preparation; and (iii) overall monitoring to assess affected person status. The PMU shall ensure the implementation of safeguard requirements as provided in the legal agreements and submit semi-annual safeguard monitoring reports on their implementation performance. The key indicators that will be monitored will include (i) actual duration of disruption and whether compensation paid for the same ; (ii) whether land for temporary relocation provided; (iii) whether temporary relocatees allowed to shift back to original location; (iv) whether vulnerability assistance provided and (v) status of vulnerable households post resettlement plan implementation. Table 20 tentatively lists the impact indicators to be studied to evaluate impacts after completing the project.

70. ADB will require the executing agency/implementation agency to:

- (i) establish and maintain procedures to monitor the progress of the implementation of safeguard plans,
- (ii) verify the compliance with safeguard measures and their progress toward intended outcomes,
- (iii) ensure the sufficient resources (human and financial) are made timely available to implement the specific action plan.
- (iv) document and disclose monitoring results and identify necessary corrective and preventive actions in the periodic monitoring reports,
- (v) follow up on these actions to ensure progress toward the desired outcomes, and
- (vi) submit periodic monitoring reports on safeguard measures as agreed with ADB.

71. The MDSC will prepare quarterly progress and semi-annual monitoring reports for submission to ADB through PMU. The monitoring reports will be based on the outcome of consultations and feedback with people, details of surveys undertaken to assess temporary impacts, measures adopted to mitigate temporary impact to businesses and residences, and review of the progress of other implementation activities, including complaints/concerns/issues raised by the affected persons. The monitoring reports will describe the progress of resettlement activities and any compliance issues and corrective actions. These reports will closely follow the involuntary resettlement monitoring indicators agreed upon at resettlement plan approval. Monitoring will include (i) the communication and feedback of people; (ii) measures taken to mitigate temporary impacts and their adequacy and timeliness; (iii) use of grievance procedures; (iv) information dissemination to affected persons on benefits; and (v) implementation timetable. A sample monitoring template is given in Appendix 5.

72. The PMU, with the support of MDSC, will be responsible for certifying encumbrance-free stretches to be handed over to the contractors based on the completion of the disbursement of assistance for temporary income loss. The PMU will submit semi-annual monitoring reports during the civil work phase and until the issuance of the project completion report. The monitoring reports will be disclosed on ADB and NCC websites upon clearance by ADB.

Appendix 5: Outline of Social Safeguards Monitoring Report

Following requirements of the ADB Safeguard Policy Statement (2009) and the *Operations Manual* section on safeguard policy (OM F1), borrowers/clients are required to establish and maintain procedures to monitor the status of implementation of safeguard plans and ensure progress is made toward the desired outcomes. For projects categorized as A or B in Involuntary Resettlement and/or Indigenous People, the Borrowers/clients are required to submit semi-annual monitoring reports for ADB review. The level of detail and comprehensiveness of a monitoring report is commensurate with the complexity and significance of social safeguards impacts (IR) and with the current status of project implementation phase.

This outline can be used for periodic monitoring report (semiannual) and RP completion report to start the civil works in the impacted areas. A safeguard monitoring report may include the following elements:

A. Executive Summary

This section provides a concise statement of project scope and impacts, key findings and recommended actions.

B. Background of the Report and Project Description

This section provides a general description of the project, including:

- (i) Background/context of the monitoring report which includes the information on the project, project components, safeguards categorizations and general scope of the social safeguards impacts.
- (ii) Information on the implementation progress of the project activities, scope of monitoring report and requirements, reporting period, including frequency of submission and changes in project scope and adjusted safeguard measures, if applicable
- (iii) Summary table of identified impacts and the mitigation actions.

C. Scope of Impacts

This section outlines the detail of:

- (i) Scale and scope of the project's safeguards impacts,
- (ii) Vulnerability status of the affected people/communities,
- (iii) Entitlements matrix and other rehabilitation measures, as applicable, as described in the approved final resettlement plan(s).

D. Compensation and Rehabilitation¹⁹

This section describes the process and progress of the implementation of the safeguards plan and other required activities as determined in the plan. This includes:

- (i) Payment of the affected assets compensation, allowances, loss of incomes, etc. to the entitled persons;

- (ii) Provisions of other types of entitlement as described in the matrix and implementation of livelihood rehabilitation activities as determined in the plan.

Quantitative as well as qualitative results of the monitoring parameters, as agreed in the plan, should be provided.

E. Public participation and consultation

This section describes public participation and consultations activities during the project implementation as agreed in the plan. This includes final consultations with affected persons during resettlement plan finalization after the completion of detail design; the numbers of activities conducted; issues raised during consultations and responses provided by the project team, implementing NGOs, project support consultants, contractors, etc.

F. Grievance Redress Mechanism

This section described the implementation of project grievance redress mechanism (GRM) as design in the approved resettlement plan. This includes evaluations of its effectiveness, procedures, complaints receive, timeliness to resolve issues/ complaints and resources provided to solve the complaints. Special attentions should be given if there are complaints received from the affected people or communities.

G. Institutional Arrangement

This section describes the actual implementation or any adjustment made to the institutional arrangement for managing the social safeguards issues in the projects. This includes the establishment of safeguards unit/ team and appointment of staff in the executing/implementing agency; implementation of the GRM and its committee; supervision and coordination between institutions involved in the management and monitoring of safeguards issues, the roles of NGO and women's groups in the monitoring and implementation of the plan, if any.

H. Monitoring Results - Findings

This section describes the summary and key findings of the monitoring activities. The results are compared against previously established benchmarks and compliance status (e.g., adequacy of IR compensation rates and timeliness of payments, adequacy and timeliness of IR rehabilitation measures including serviced housing sites, house reconstruction, livelihood support measures, and training; budget for implementing rettlement plan, timeliness and adequacy of capacity building, etc.). It also compared against the objectives of safeguards or desired outcomes documented (e.g., involuntary resettlement impacts avoided or minimized; livelihood restored or enhanced; If noncompliance or any major gaps identified, include the recommendation of corrective action plan.

I. Compliance Status

This section will summarize the compliance status of the project activities with the loan covenants, ADB SPS (2009) on safeguard resettlement (SR) 2 and the approved final resettlement plan (s).

J. Follow up Actions, Recommendation and Disclosure

This section describes recommendations and further actions or items to focus on for the remaining monitoring period. It also includes lesson learned for improvement for future safeguards

monitoring activities. Disclosure dates of the monitoring report to the affected communities should also be included. A time-bound summary table for required actions should be included, with the following:

- (i) List of affected persons and entitlements
- (ii) Summary of resettlement plan with entitlement matrix
- (iii) Copies of affected persons certification of payment
- (iv) Summary of minutes of meetings during public consultations
- (v) Summary of complaints received and status of their resolution.
