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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

**Project Description.** ADB approved the Urban Infrastructure Improvement Preparatory Facility, a project readiness financing (PRF) loan to strengthen Narayanganj City Corporation's (NCC) technical and implementation capacity to prepare the proposed project. The PRF supported the preparation of feasibility studies, detailed designs, draft bidding documents, and advance procurement for the Narayanganj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project (NGRUDP). The project intends to improve urban living conditions in Narayanganj City, adjacent to Dhaka. The project will (i) ensure long-term water security in selected zones in NCC areas by improving and expanding the water supply system, (ii) improve living conditions by developing or upgrading stormwater drainage systems in priority areas, and (iii) improve urban mobility by laying a riverside road within NCC with adjoining public spaces. This project will support infrastructure development in Narayanganj City by building upon infrastructure and capacity-building initiatives. The project will also support institutional strengthening of NCC in the optimal operation and maintenance of the project assets, in providing other basic urban services, and in the digitalization of administrative services.

**Project Components.** The water supply component comprises two contracts. Contract 1 includes new distribution networks for demand management zone (DMZ) 1 (13 (part), 14, 15, 16, 17, 18), DMZ 2 (8, 10, 11, 12, 13 (part)); rehabilitation of existing Godenail water treatment plant (WTP) and deep tube wells (DTWs) with operation and maintenance and Contract 2 which includes new distribution networks in district metered areas (DMA) 5, 6 & 7 of DMZ 3, confluence wellfield containing 20 production tube wells (PTW) and collector pipelines.

**Resettlement Plan** This draft resettlement plan has been prepared to address the temporary involuntary resettlement impacts arising out of laying the water pipeline distribution network and associated activities such as laying of transmission mains, construction of PTWs and associated connector pipelines in DMZ 1-3 of Narayanganj city and is consistent with the entitlement matrix for the project prepared in accordance with the national laws and ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS), 2009. This draft plan will be updated based on the final engineering design, detailed measurement survey (DMS), census survey, and site-specific consultations before the start of civil works and disclosed on the NCC and ADB websites.

**Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement Impacts** The project does not involve any private land acquisition or permanent involuntary resettlement impacts. The proposed works will be carried out within the government-owned encumbrance-free land, and pipelines will be laid within the available road rights of way (ROW) on existing road margins. However, laying the water supply pipelines will cause temporary involuntary resettlement impacts (temporary income loss) to businesses / mobile vendors along the road margins due to the excavation of trenches to lay new water pipelines and associated civil works. The project will use trenchless technology to minimize the impacts. Based on the survey, it is estimated that 641 businesses (2525 family members) will have temporary income loss. Out of the 641, 522 (covering 1593 family members) are permanent shops carrying out business activities in pucca, semi-pucca, and kutcha structures along the edge of the narrow roads. These permanent shops are likely to be temporarily impacted during the period of construction in case the contractor is unable to provide access to the shops. Another 119 (covering 932 family members) are mobile vendors (having pushcarts, display tables, baskets, etc.) who will move to a nearby location during construction and return after completion of construction. In addition, the project will likely impact 368 employees working with the businesses identified to be impacted. Involuntary resettlement impacts will be further reviewed and revalidated during a detailed measurement survey (DMS) based on the pipelines' final detailed design and alignment. Census and socio-economic survey

including vulnerability status of any affected person will be undertaken if any new areas are proposed, or any temporary impacts such as seasonal crop cultivation is identified. The draft resettlement plan will be updated based on assessment of impacts for the new areas and findings of the DMS.

**Tribes, Minor Races, Ethnic Sects, and Communities.** Based on the Population and Housing Census 2011, Narayanganj district as a whole has 183 households belonging to small ethnic communities, which cover 0.03% of the total households of the district.<sup>1</sup> No direct or indirect impacts to the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems or territories, or natural or cultural resources that are used, owned, occupied, or claimed by Tribes, Minor Races, Ethnic Sects, and Communities (TMRESC) population/indigenous peoples as their ancestral domain or asset, is anticipated. The surveys have not revealed the presence of any TMRESC population living within the proposed project area. The NGRUDP is classified as Category C for Indigenous Peoples as per the ADB's SPS, 2009.

**Entitlements, Assurances, and Benefits** The project is likely to have the following impact that will require compensation and/or mitigation measures: (i) compensation for temporary loss of income to shop owners, including mobile vendors, (ii) shifting allowance mobile vendors, (iii) vulnerable assistance, (iv) income loss to employees, and (v) compensation on account of loss of crops. Affected persons are entitled to compensation and resettlement benefits as specified in the entitlement matrix.

**Consultation and Disclosure** During the initial impact assessment and project information dissemination, participatory discussions were held with the people around the project area through focus group discussions (FGD) across Narayanganj attended by several stakeholders (ward councilors, local businessmen, laborers, landowners, women, and the general population). The project conducted 16 FGDs in November 2022 and December 2023, covering 335 participants (266 males and 69 females). During FGDs, it was revealed that participants were aware of the local area's drainage-related issues and supported the project. A resettlement information leaflet in the form of a public information brochure, both in English and Bangla, containing information on compensation, entitlement, and resettlement management adopted for the project, will be developed and distributed among the key stakeholders and will be made available in (i) the office of the NCC, and (ii) local ward-level offices. The resettlement plan will be disclosed to affected persons and on the NCC and ADB websites.

**Grievance Redress Mechanism** A common grievance redress mechanism (GRM) will be in place to receive, evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of social, environmental, or any other project-related grievances. The GRM will provide an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating the resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the project. The project will have a multi-tier GRM, each tier having time-bound schedules and with responsible persons identified to address grievances and seek appropriate persons' advice at each stage, as required. Public awareness campaigns will be conducted regularly to ensure awareness of the project, including GRM. The campaign will ensure that the poor, vulnerable, and others are aware of and part of the project.

**Implementation Arrangements** The NCC is the executing agency for the Project and will be responsible for the management, coordination, and execution of all activities funded under the

project. A dedicated project management unit (PMU) has been established within the NCC to implement the project components and is headed by a project director (superintendent engineer rank officer). The chief social welfare officer at PMU will be the nodal officer for social safeguards and gender and will be responsible for ensuring compliance with ADB's SPS, 2009, during the project implementation, including monitoring and reporting. The PMU will appoint a management, design, and supervision consultant (MDSC) to assist the PMU in the overall management and implementation of the NGRUDP.

**Resettlement Budget and Financing Plan** The estimated budget for the proposed project resettlement plan is BDT 16.98 million. The budget includes resettlement assistance, as outlined in the entitlement matrix, support costs for resettlement plan implementation, and contingency. The NCC will be responsible for releasing the funds in a timely manner. All compensations, as outlined in the entitlement matrix, will be disbursed to the identified affected persons (as per the project cut-off date) prior to the commencement of any civil work.

**Monitoring and reporting** The implementation of the resettlement plan will be closely monitored to provide the NCC with an effective basis for assessing resettlement progress and identifying potential difficulties and problems. The monitoring will focus on (i) the shifting of vendors to the new location and (ii) temporary impacts during shifting (the number of days for which compensation is paid versus the number of actual days of disruption of business). Unanticipated impacts and grievance redress will be monitored during construction, and corrective actions will be taken in accordance with the agreed entitlement matrix. With the support of MDSC, NCC will prepare monitoring reports and submit them to ADB semi-annually. Additionally, ADB will monitor projects continuously until a project completion report is issued.

## I. INTRODUCTION

### A. Overview of the Project

1. ADB approved the Urban Infrastructure Improvement Preparatory Facility, a project readiness financing (PRF) loan for \$11 million, to strengthen Narayanganj City Corporation's (NCC) technical and implementation capacity to prepare the proposed project. The PRF supported the preparation of feasibility studies, detailed designs, draft bidding documents, and advance procurement for the Narayanganj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project (NGRUDP). The project intends to improve urban living conditions in Narayanganj City, adjacent to Dhaka. The project will (i) ensure long-term water security in selected zones in NCC areas by improving and expanding the water supply system, (ii) improve living conditions by developing or upgrading stormwater drainage systems in priority areas, and (iii) improve urban mobility by laying a riverside road within NCC with adjoining public spaces. This project will support infrastructure development in Narayanganj City by building upon infrastructure and capacity-building initiatives. The project will also support institutional strengthening of NCC in the optimal operation and maintenance of the project assets, in providing other basic urban services, and in the digitalization of administrative services. Narayanganj is the fourth most populated urban area in Bangladesh. The city is facing many challenges from unplanned and uncontrolled development.

2. The project has built-in components to ensure that infrastructure is climate resilient, designed with consideration for the poor, and promotes effective gender mainstreaming. The investment loan is consistent with the vision in Bangladesh's Eighth Five-Year Plan (2021–2025) to ensure access for all to adequate, safe, affordable drinking water and sanitation facilities and provide access to safe, accessible, and sustainable transport systems. The investment loan is aligned with the strategic objectives of the Asian Development Bank (ADB) country partnership strategy for Bangladesh (2021–2025) to promote green growth and climate resilience and to strengthen human capital. The NCC, under the Local Government Division of the Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives, will be the executing and implementing agency of the project.

3. The project is aligned with the following impacts: (i) sustainable and inclusive urban development achieved, and (ii) safe and climate-resilient delta area achieved. The project will have the following outcome: NCC's resilience and access to inclusive, reliable, and sustainable urban services improved.

4. **Output 1: Climate-resilient and inclusive infrastructure developed and/or improved.** The project will improve and expand the existing water supply system for inclusive, resilient, and safely managed continuous drinking water supply services in the priority areas in NCC to serve 0.6 million people. These will include rehabilitation of the existing WTP and 18 tube wells, replacement and expansion of the pipe network with DMA approaches to reduce nonrevenue water (NRW),<sup>2</sup> and installation of 20 new tube wells in selected areas for supply

augmentation.<sup>3</sup> The low-income communities (LICs) in the project area will be fully provided with a continuous water supply.<sup>4</sup> The project will also establish and improve the stormwater drainage system in the priority areas to reduce waterlogging and flood risk with climate and disaster-resilient design and nature-based solutions such as introducing soil and vegetation. Further, the project will develop a total of 5 hectares of green public parks to improve the quality of life of the citizens, with features responsive to women and the vulnerable, to provide recreational spaces, and to reduce urban heat.

**5. Output 2: Capacity and awareness of NCC and the local community in climate-resilient, sustainable, and inclusive urban services strengthened.** To improve sustainability and quality of services through the facilities developed under output 1, the project will strengthen NCC staff capacity (including at least 90% of female staff) in climate-resilient, sustainable, and gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) responsive service delivery.<sup>5</sup> It will develop service improvement plans including financial aspects for sustainable O&M. For water supply, NCC's capacity on O&M will be improved through on-the-job training by the contractor that will be responsible for O&M for the initial two years.<sup>6</sup> DMA management and water quality monitoring will be supported.<sup>7</sup> The project will also support preparation of masterplans for wastewater, solid waste management, and urban planning to improve living environment in an integrated manner, combined with the intervention under the project, and advance climate and disaster resilience. The project will also support GESI-sensitive community awareness and behavior change campaigns on water, sanitation and hygiene, climate resilience, and sustainable services to maximize the health and economic impact of the investments.<sup>8</sup> This output, together with the infrastructure to be developed under the output 1, is expected to lead to achieving the intended outcome of improved resilience and access to inclusive, reliable and sustainable urban services.

**Output 3. Institutional capacity and governance of other municipal services strengthened.** The project will support a wide range of measures for municipal revenue augmentation, such as improvements in property tax, advertisement tax, and assets rents,<sup>9</sup> as well as technical upgradation of the existing systems including tax database, collection mechanism, and other revenue administration system and a grievances redressal system. Further, to improve municipal services other than those supported under outputs 1 and 2, the project will also support capacity building of the NCC staff and elected representatives for governance improvements, including better transparency and monitoring mechanisms of

municipal services involving citizen participation. It will build on NCC's successful past performance in governance improvement. The project will also strengthen NCC's administrative efficiency with a focus on a smoother citizen interface through digitalization of customer records, asset management, and procurement. This output is proposed to be funded by the attached TA and is expected to contribute to achieving the project outcome through consolidated financial, administrative, and governance strengthening.

## **B. Project Description**

6. The existing water supply system in Narayanganj is in poor condition. Water to the Narayanganj city is supplied from two sources: (i) a conventional water treatment plant (WTP) (flocculation/sedimentation/rapid gravity filtration) constructed in the 1980s on the west bank of the Shitalakshya River at Godenail. The plant has not been properly maintained over the years, with the result that many of the treatment stages are inoperable, leading to a reduction in capacity of the plant from its design value of 45 MLD to its current 23 MLD and (ii) 36 deep tube wells (DTW) which provide an average of 98 MLD, 17 of which are located on the west side of the Shitalakshya river and provide 46 MLD.

7. Due to the poor quality of the raw water from the Shitalakshya River and the lack of space for expansion at the existing WTP site, an interim solution for water supply to the central areas of Narayanganj has been developed. This comprises a limited extension and rehabilitation of Godenail WTP (45 MLD) through the installation of a new pre-treatment system using Moving Bed Biofilm Reactor (MBBR) technology with chemical treatment together with a proposed new wellfield adjacent to Brahmaputra River south of Narayanganj. The latter is expected to supply 50-100 MLD from DTWs using an induced bank filtration (IBF) technique. In addition, the existing DTWs will be rehabilitated. A new distribution network (approximately 275 km) will be installed in the western part of the city (demand management zone [DMZ] 1, 2, and part 3), and all customer connections therein will be renewed with smart meters.

8. The project comprises the design, construction, and 2-year operation service of the following elements: (i) Rehabilitation of existing Godenail WTP to 45 MLD; (ii) rehabilitation of existing 17 DTWs and pump houses and provision of chlorination facilities; (iii) new IBF wellfield at confluence area (20 production tube wells [PTW]), (iv) transmission main from river crossing to Khanpur Twin Towers; (v) installation of piped distribution networks in DMZs 1, 2 and part DMZ 3; (vi) transmission main from Godenail WTP to DMZ 3 boundary; and (vii) house connections. The water supply project has been divided into two contract packages: (a) contract No. W-01 – new distribution networks for DMZ 1 and DMZ 2; rehabilitation of existing Godenail WTP and DTWs with O&M; and (b) contract No. W-02 - New Distribution Networks in DMAs 5, 6 & 7 of DMZ 3, Confluence wellfield and transmission pipeline.


Figure 1: Water Supply Contract Arrangements showing Contract 1 and 2

9. The distribution of district-metering areas (DMA) in the DMZs is given in Table 1. The proposed water pipeline lengths and the diameter of the pipelines are given in Table 2, and the length of the collector pipelines<sup>10</sup> is provided in Table 3. DMZ 1, 2, and 3 comprise a number of DMAs. The water supply contract arrangements are given in Figure 1, and the locations of the 20 PTWs, the wellfield, and the collector pipelines are given in Figure 2.



### C. Profile of the Project Area

10. Narayanganj is the southeast gateway of Dhaka and one of the country's oldest industrial and trade centers, particularly for textile industries. Due to rapid population growth and urbanization, it became a city corporation from a pourashava<sup>11</sup> in 2011, substantially increasing NCC's administrative responsibility for wider municipal services. However, the city suffers from haphazard infrastructure development and deficient urban basic services, which requires an integrated solution. Piped water supply is provided only a few hours per day, and the water quality is low due to the ageing facility. The groundwater level has lowered due to over-extraction,<sup>12</sup> while the surface water source in the city is also increasingly polluted due to industrialization. As a result, people, especially females, are often overburdened with the drudgery of collecting water and caregiving responsibilities due to the prevalence of waterborne or vector-borne diseases.<sup>13</sup> Roads are mostly narrow with heavy traffic.<sup>14</sup> There are only very limited public spaces for recreational activities which aggravates a low standard of living.<sup>15</sup>

## D. Minimizing Impacts

11. Adequate measures have been taken during project preparation to minimize the adverse impacts of land acquisition and resettlement impacts within the alignment. For the construction of the PTWs and the laying of the water supply pipeline, the NCC proposes using the encumbrance-free government-owned land and existing road rights of way (ROW) belonging to the government. It has been assessed that laying the water pipeline works with the ROW and on the edges of the carriageway will require temporary shifting of 119 mobile vendors (tea stalls, vegetable shops, etc.). Temporarily affected mobile hawkers and vendors, including those with stalls and temporary structures, will be assisted by the project in moving to alternative locations to continue business during the period of construction and allowed to return once construction in the area is declared complete. The businesses that need to move will be allowed to come back to their original location after the completion of the civil works and will be compensated for lost income for the actual number of days of disruption. Additional assistance will be provided to vulnerable affected persons. In addition, temporary income loss to 522 commercial structures along the sides of the roads, is estimated along narrow roads. Loss of income for the construction period will be compensated for, if the contractor cannot provide access to continue the business.

12. During the execution of the civil works to avoid and minimize the resettlement impacts, the project will implement the following measures: (i) announcement of proposed civil works in advance; (ii) provide access to shops and residences or other buildings along alignments by providing wooden planks, metal sheets and ramps with handrails (iii) increased workforces to finish work quickly in areas with impacts on access; (iv) phased construction schedule and working on one segment or one side of the road at a time; ensure management of traffic during the laying of the pipeline; (v) work to be carried out during non-business hours (generally after 11 pm and before 4 am and on market holidays) to the extent possible; (vi) adopting trenchless technology ; and (vi) assistance to mobile vendors, if any present during construction, to shift nearby and to shift back.

## E. Scope and Objective of the Resettlement Plan

13. This draft resettlement plan has been prepared to address the potential involuntary resettlement impacts due to the proposed project components for cleaning and rehabilitation of the existing drainage system and construction of new drains and is consistent with the entitlement matrix for the project prepared in accordance with the Government of Bangladesh's (GOB) Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property Act, 2017 (ARIPA) and ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement, (SPS) 2009 and to meet the following objectives:

- (i) to describe the identified scope and extent of land acquisition and involuntary resettlement impacts because of identified project components and address them through appropriate recommendations and mitigation measures in the resettlement plan;
- (ii) to present the socio-economic profile of the population in the project area, identify social impacts, including impacts on the poor and vulnerable, and the

- needs and priorities of different sections of the population, including women, poor and vulnerable;
- (iii) to describe the likely economic impacts and identified livelihood risks of the proposed project components;
  - (iv) to describe the process undertaken during project design to engage stakeholders and the planned information disclosure measures, and the process for carrying out consultation with affected people and facilitating their participation during project implementation;
  - (v) to establish a framework for grievance redress for affected persons that is appropriate to the local context in consultation with stakeholders;
  - (vi) to describe the applicable national and local legal framework for the project and define the involuntary resettlement policy principles applicable to the project;
  - (vii) to define entitlements of affected persons and assistance and benefits available under the project;
  - (viii) to present a budget for resettlement and define institutional arrangements, implementation responsibilities, and implementation schedule for resettlement implementation; and
  - (ix) to describe the monitoring mechanism that will be used to monitor the resettlement plan implementation

#### **F. Updating of draft resettlement plan**

14. Involuntary resettlement impacts will be further reviewed and revalidated during a DMS based on the pipelines' final detailed design and alignment. Census and socio-economic survey including vulnerability status of any affected person will be undertaken if any new areas are proposed, or any temporary impacts such as seasonal crop cultivation is identified. The draft resettlement plan will be updated based on assessments of impacts for the new areas and findings of the DMS.

## **II. SCOPE OF LAND ACQUISITION AND RESETTLEMENT**

### **A. Scope of Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement**

15. **Contract 1:** The Contract 1 components do not involve acquisition of any private land; all project components are proposed within the existing road alignment. Based on the census surveys, proposed interventions and their potential involuntary resettlement impacts are assessed to entail only temporary income loss of economic activity along the water supply pipe alignments.

16. Contract 1 pipelines are passing through the built-up city area and will cause temporary impacts to shops and residences due to restricted access arising from the excavation of trenches for the laying of pipelines. Trenchless technology is proposed to be used predominantly. All the pipelines will run along the road margins or the center line. Impacts will be minimized by using the existing right-of-way of the Corporation, working at night time, and providing temporary access to businesses and residences for undisturbed movement of people. Road restoration is will be within 28 days of being dug up and back filling within 7 of days of removal of casting. The civil works will be undertaken section-wise. It has been assessed that laying the water pipeline works with the ROW and on the edges of the carriageway will require temporary shifting of an estimated 119 mobile vendors (tea stalls, vegetable shops, etc.). Temporarily affected mobile hawkers and vendors, including those with stalls and temporary

structures, will be assisted by the project in moving to alternative locations to continue with their business during the brief period of construction and allowed to return once construction in the area is declared complete. The businesses that need to move will be allowed to come back to their original location after the completion of the civil works and will be compensated for lost income for the number of days of disruption. Additional assistance will be provided to vulnerable affected persons. In addition, for 522 commercial structures located along the sides of the roads, temporary income loss is estimated as the roads adjoining the shops are narrow. Loss of income for the construction period will be paid if the contractor cannot provide access to continue the business.

#### **B. Procedures for assistance for temporary resettlement impacts**

17. Temporary impact arising out of excavation civil works will be mitigated as detailed below:

- (i) PMU will conduct public awareness and information dissemination prior to construction works with the support of a management, design, and supervision consultant (MDSC).
- (ii) PMU's social and gender officer, site engineers, and the contractor to identify alignments that will involve temporary livelihood impacts.
- (iii) PMU social and gender officer and site engineers, with the contractor's support, determine the extent/nature of impacts on identified roads where economic impacts are likely.
- (iv) PMU social and gender officer and site engineers, with the contractor's support and in consultation with the shops facing potential impact, develop mechanisms to ensure the continuance of access to persons.
- (v) PMU social and gender officer and site engineers closely monitor the contractor to ensure civil works are carried out while ensuring access to persons.
- (vi) Wherever the continuance of business is not possible, PMU's social and gender officer and site engineer will assess the period of disruption to business, estimate the assistance to be paid, and ensure payment after necessary approvals.

18. Businesses /vendors requiring to temporarily shift during the period of excavation of trenches for construction of drains will be notified in advance and assisted in shifting nearby for the continuance of the trade with limited disruption. They will be allowed to return to the original location after construction is complete. Assistance to businesses/ mobile vendors along the road margin will involve the following:

- (i) Identification of impacted vendors based on detailed design by PMU's social and gender officer and site engineer with the support of the contractor.
- (ii) Notify at least 30 days in advance, followed by a reminder 7 days and again 24 hours in advance.
- (iii) Identify alternative locations nearby for affected businesses/mobilevendors to continue business.
- (iv) In case of any income disruption during this time, compensation for lost income to be paid by the project through PMU.

- (v) Assistance by the contractor to return to the original location after construction works are completed.

19. **Contract 2:** The 20 PTWs in the wellfields and the launching and receiving shafts are identified on government land belonging to NCC. The distribution, collector pipelines, and transmission lines will be laid on NCC land. The letter confirming the land ownership from NCC is given in **Appendix 1**. The letters initiating approval from the relevant authorities, BIWTA, and the Railways have been issued by NCC. The letters are attached in **Appendix 2**. This resettlement plan will be updated with the approval letters. Table 5 provides the land ownership status for the 20 PTWs and the resettlement impacts. The assessment of temporary impacts in the resettlement plan will be updated based on a census survey of temporarily affected persons following the finalization of designs.

### C. Tribes, Minor Races, Ethnic Sects, and Communities

20. Based on the Population and Housing Census 2011, Narayanganj district as a whole has 183 households belonging to small ethnic communities, which cover 0.03% of the total households of the district.<sup>17</sup> No direct or indirect impacts to the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems or territories, or natural or cultural resources that are used, owned, occupied, or claimed by Tribes, Minor Races, Ethnic Sects, and Communities (TMRESC) population/indigenous peoples as their ancestral domain or asset, is anticipated. The surveys have not revealed the presence of any TMRESC population living within the proposed project area. The NGRUDP is classified as category C for indigenous people as per the ADB's SPS, 2009.

## III. SOCIO-ECONOMIC INFORMATION AND PROFILE

### A. Profile of Affected Persons

21. The profile of the affected persons likely to be affected by the project is based on the socio-economic surveys carried out in DMZ 1-3. The socio-economic survey was conducted between 21 December 2022 to 30 January 2023. The vendors and roadside shops may face temporary impact to their livelihood due to access disruption during the laying of the water supply pipeline; however, no impact on their structures is anticipated. A wide range of data, including social category, type of losses, type of occupation, and sources of income, have been collected for social-economic profile of the affected persons, discussed below. The details of the census survey are given in **Appendix 3**.

#### 1. Demography

22. The survey indicated 641 households with a total population of 2525 persons will be impacted. The average household size for the surveyed population is 3.94. The male population accounts for 54.57 percent of the surveyed population, while females account for 45.43 percent. The national sex ratio is 1020 females:1000 males<sup>18</sup> (2022). The details are given in Table 6.

23. Most affected people belong to the Muslim community, with 602 households (93.92%), and the remaining 39 (6.08%) are Hindus. Table 7 provides the population by religion.

### 3. Type of Asset owned by the Affected Person

24. The type of asset used for business by mobile vendors is pushcarts (54.62%), followed by tarpaulins (23.53%) laid out on the ground to display the goods. All the businesses with display tables, pushcarts, baskets, etc., can be easily moved to a nearby location where the affected persons can continue their business. Table 8 provides the distribution of assets owned by mobile vendors to carry out business.

### 4. Types of commercial structures

25. There are 522 structures along the road where commercial activities are carried out. These are very narrow roads, and access will likely be blocked for these businesses during construction unless the contractor makes adequate arrangements for access. Table 9 provides the distribution of structures.

### 5. Type/ nature of Business/ livelihood

26. The most common businesses include grocery (25.90%), tea stalls (18.25%), vegetable vendors (4.84%), fruits (4.52%), hotels (6.71%) and street food (4.52%). A whole gamut of business is being carried out, including selling cosmetics, electronic goods, mobile accessories, crockery, leather items, laundry, cobblers, etc. Table 10 details some of the common types of business carried out by the affected population.

## 6. Daily Net Income

27. The daily net income reported varies from BDT 200 to BDT 5000. It is observed that most of the affected persons (62.40 %) earn between BDT 501 and BDT 1000, while 27.7% earn less than BDT 500. The average daily income the mobile vendors earn is BDT 580; for the kutcha and pucca shops, the average daily income is BDT 850. The average daily income was used to calculate the budgetary provision. Table 11 provides the daily net income reported by the respondents.

## 7. Employees

28. 97 businesses have hired employees. There are a total of 340 employees who will have income losses. These employees will be paid for loss of income if the employers do not continue to pay them due to the temporary closure of business. Incomes vary from BDT 200 per day to BDT 1000 per day. Based on the survey, the average per-day income of the employees is approximately BDT 488, which, for the budget estimate, has been rounded off to BDT 500 per day.

## 8. Vulnerability

29. As per the entitlement matrix, the following population groups are considered vulnerable and thus need special consideration. They include (i) woman-headed households, (ii) households having a person with disability, (iii) households belonging to tribes, minor races and ethnic sects, (iv) elderly-headed households, (v) children including orphans, child workers, (vi) below poverty line households, (vii) *Shudra/Rabidas/Harijan* (lower) castes, (viii) landless

households and (ix) those without legal title. All the 641 surveyed households are non-titled and hence identified as vulnerable.

**B. Common Property Resources**

30. There are no CPRs that will be impacted. The contractor will have to ensure suitable and safe access, to all the CPRs during construction.

#### IV. CONSULTATION, PARTICIPATION AND DISCLOSURE

##### A. Consultation and Participation Process

31. The resettlement plan was prepared in consultation with the affected persons and key stakeholders. The objective of the consultation meetings was to inform and get feedback from the affected population and the community/ residents of NCC regarding the proposed interventions. The key stakeholders consulted during resettlement plan preparation include (i) affected persons, including vulnerable households, (ii) program beneficiaries, (iii) elected representatives, (iv) ward-level committees, and (v) local government and relevant government agencies representatives.

32. The participants were already aware of the project and expressed their willingness to provide support during the execution of the work. During the meeting, the stakeholders were briefed about the technical details of the project and implementation schedule, project benefits and adverse impacts envisaged during construction, environmental and social safeguards, gender inclusion, community participation aspects built into the project, etc. Issues like the extent of the project and development components, benefits of the project, traffic disruptions, and impacts on livelihood were discussed in detail with the stakeholders. There was no opposition to the proposed projects as the work would benefit the local population.

33. During the project preparation, 16 focus group discussions (FGD) and three public consultations were carried out between September 2022, November 2023, and December 2023 across all wards, covering 335 participants (266 males and 69 females). The ward-wise details of the FGDs conducted are provided in Table 12, and the minutes of the meetings, photographs, and attendance sheets are attached as **Appendix 4**.

## B. Findings of the Community Consultations

34. The main issues discussed during the FGD sessions include:

- (i) The participants stated that they were aware that the government was planning a new water network to provide adequate and safe water. They have received the information from the NCC officials, public representatives, etc.
- (ii) Participants shared that the present water supply is very poor. They are getting an inadequate water supply of 40/50 lpcd. This water is not clean and smells.
- (iii) The present water supply pipe network is not in good shape, and the common people are always searching for alternative clean sources.
- (iv) The participants felt that the project would affect street vendors, temporary shopkeepers, floating businessmen, and those running their businesses using pushcarts/display tables/tarpaulin, etc. will be affected. These people are anxious about getting displaced. The women especially demanded rehabilitation and compensation. They worry about their children, family, and livelihood if they are shifted. Some people have occupied government land for commercial and residential purposes and are concerned about displacement.

- (v) The participants suggested that NCC should monitor the compensation distribution process so that affected people could get their compensation dues directly without any harassment.
- (vi) Among the participants involved with business at the haat or bazar, they were very worried about their business because they would face economic loss if displaced due to the laying of the pipeline. Under such circumstances, they expressed their anxiety about what alternative would be provided for them to continue their business activities.
- (vii) The participants of the consultation meeting supported the NCC's plan. They said that the project would give them better water, improve family health and reduce health costs, provide relief from waterborne disease, and support freeing up time, resulting in economic benefits.
- (viii) The participants thanked the Government and NCC for taking up this pragmatic plan to ensure safe and adequate water facilities by improving and establishing a new water pipe network.

### **C. Public Consultations**

35. The project authorities, along with consultants, conducted three public consultations on Water Supply at (i) NCC Conference Hall on 7 December 2023; (ii) Councilors Office, Narayanganj Ward No.14, on 30<sup>th</sup> November 2023; and (iii) near Councilors Office, ward 15 on 29<sup>th</sup> November 2023. The objective of the consultations was (i) dissemination of water supply plan for city dwellers, including marginalized groups and commuters in Narayanganj City; (ii) information sharing on potential impacts, safeguard plans, crisis mitigation measures, and management of the service/system; (iii) understanding the community's demand for water supply with feedback from beneficiaries and stakeholders; (iv) review of potential impacts of the interventions and ensuring protection of social and environmental safeguards and (v) encourage participation of beneficiary communities and stakeholders in construction, monitoring and management of water supply. The participants included a Councillor, community groups such as teachers, religious leaders, senior citizens, women's group representatives), Government agency officials (DWASA, LGED, DPHE, Social Welfare, DC's office, BIWTA, Bangladesh Railway), NGOs, sports/cultural groups, media, and NCC/ADB/PSPS officials. The meeting minutes, attendance sheet, and photographs are given in **Appendix 4**.

36. Further consultations with various stakeholders including women will be carried out throughout the project cycle. The PMU will conduct the consultations with the support of the MDSC. Consultation is a continuous process and will be conducted at several levels during resettlement plan implementation that includes (i) heads of households/members likely to be impacted, (ii) ward-level members, and (iii) community-based organizations (CBOs). The consultation will involve (i) dissemination of information on the resettlement plan, including entitlements; this will involve explaining the entitlement matrix and resettlement process to the affected persons and soliciting their support and cooperation; (ii) dissemination of information on the temporary relocation site during construction; (iii) dissemination of information on likely date of shifting, etc.

37. Particular attention will be paid to the needs of the vulnerable groups. The PMU will ensure that any views of the affected persons, particularly vulnerable people, related to the shifting process are looked into and addressed. The PMU will ensure that groups and individuals consulted are informed about the outcome of the decision-making process and confirm how their views were incorporated. Women's participation will be ensured by involving

them in public consultation at various stages of project preparation. The venue and the time of meetings will be convenient for women.

#### **D. Information Disclosure**

38. The draft and the final resettlement plan will be duly uploaded to ADB and project websites. Before implementing the project, the draft resettlement plan will be updated based on the final design, and a 100% socio-economic survey of the affected households will be conducted. The draft and final resettlement plan will be duly disclosed on ADB and project websites and available at (i) the NCC office and (ii) local-level ward offices. During the project implementation, construction schedules will be informed to all residents (including affected persons) through signboards before the commencement of pipe laying. The signboards will be in the local language and will include, at a minimum, (i) the section to be affected, (ii) start and end dates, (iii) information on traffic rerouting, if any, and (iv) contact information for questions/grievances.

39. A resettlement information leaflet in the form of a public information disclosure brochure (PID), both in English and Bangla, containing information on compensation, entitlement, and resettlement management adopted for the project, will be developed and distributed among the key stakeholders. The PID brochure will include the following information: (i) a brief background of the project (ii) resettlement impacts; (iii) the entitlements due to the affected persons; (v) timing of payments; (vi) the schedule of displacement; (vii) grievance redress mechanism; and (viii) contact persons at NCC. Information dissemination and consultation will continue throughout the project cycle. The template for project information and disclosure leaflet is given in Appendix 8.

#### **E. Consultation and Participation Plan**

40. A consultation and participation plan will be prepared for the project. A program of continuous consultation is proposed. The primary purpose of the consultation and participation plan is to disseminate information and to open up the lines of communication between the NCC and all stakeholders to facilitate the implementation of the project and the early resolution of any conflict issues that may arise. The consultation and participation plan will include the communication processes and activities that will take place throughout the project. Community mobilisers at MDSC will be trained and responsible for consultations throughout the project period.

## **V. GRIEVANCE REDRESS MECHANISM**

41. A project-specific GRM will be established to receive, evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of affected persons' concerns, complaints, and grievances about social and environmental performance at the project level. The GRM will aim to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns associated with the Project.

42. A common GRM will be in place for social, environmental, or any other grievances related to the Project. The GRM will provide an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating the resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the investment program. The multi-tier GRM for the Project is outlined below, with each tier having time-bound schedules and responsible persons identified to address grievances and seek appropriate persons' advice at each stage, as required.

43. The Project area-wide public awareness campaigns will ensure that knowledge of the grievance redress procedures is generated. The PMU will conduct awareness campaigns to ensure that all affected persons and vulnerable households are made aware of grievance redress procedures and entitlements. Contractors will provide pamphlets to communities before starting work, and billboards will be installed during construction. The pamphlets and billboards will include relevant environmental and social safeguards, GRM information, and contact details of key personnel from PMU, MDSC, and contractors.

44. Affected persons will have the flexibility of conveying grievances/suggestions by dropping grievance redress/suggestion forms in complaints/suggestion boxes to be installed by PMU. Grievances can be sent by post, e-mail, and by writing in the complaints register in the PMU office. The project will also have an option of registering complaints/grievances through NCC website.. Careful documentation of the name of the complainant, date of receipt of the complaint, address/contact details of the person, location of the problem area, and how the problem was resolved will be undertaken. The PMU social and environmental officers will be responsible for timely grievance redress on environmental and social safeguards issues and for registration of grievances, related disclosure, and communication with the aggrieved party. A copy of a proposed outline of a grievance registration form is given in **Appendix 5**. All the documents made available to the public will include information on the contact number, address, and contact person for registering grievances and will be disseminated throughout the project area by the PMU.

### **A. Existing Grievance Mechanism**


45. The current methods of registering complaints include complaint registration at the Office of the Executive Engineer at the Godnail water treatment plant or the office of the concerned elected representatives (ward councilors and the mayor). The complaints are filed through e-mails, phone calls, WhatsApp messages, etc. The complaint-receiving person sends these grievances to the NCC's concerned officer/department for resolution. More significant issues are resolved in consultation with the mayor of NCC. The existing grievance redress process is currently not formalized.

### **B. Proposed Grievance Redress Mechanism under Narayanganj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project**

46. The existing NCC grievance redress processes will be integrated into the proposed project-specific grievance redress mechanism established for the Project. The NCC will establish the grievance redress committees (GRC) at the local, Project, and apex levels to provide a mechanism to mediate conflict and disputes concerning compensation payments and cut down on lengthy litigation. The contact numbers and names of the concerned staff and contractors will be posted at all construction sites in visible locations. The proposed grievance redress mechanism for the Project is given below.

- (i) **Local level (first level):** The on-site contractor's safeguards (social and environment) Officer/ Assistant Engineer of the PMU/ social and environment officer, NCC, will receive and record the complaint at the project site. Alternatively, the complaint can be registered by phone call, e-mail, or on the NCC website, and this will be forwarded to the on-site personnel for first-level resolution. The complaint will be reviewed by the local level GRC comprising of (i) Deputy Project Director, NCC, who will be the convener; other members include social and environment officer, NCC; (iii) Councilor- reserved seat; (iv) Councilor- concerned ward; (v) GRM Focal (Chief Social Welfare Officer); (vi) Assistant Engineer NCC (designated as member secretary); and (iv) Resettlement/Social Specialist and Environment Specialist of the MDSC. The contractor's site engineer and Environment, Health, and Safety (EHS) cum social supervisor will jointly support in meetings, consultations, and site-level grievance resolution. The effort will be made to resolve issues on-site, in consultation with each other, and within seven days of receipt of a complaint/grievance.
- (ii) **Project level (second level):** All grievances that cannot be redressed within seven days at the local level will be brought to the notice of the Project level GRC, comprising of the Project Director who will be the convener; other members include the Deputy Project Director (sectoral); Social Safeguards Officer (PMU); Environment Safeguards Officer (PMU); Team Leader, MDSC (designated as member secretary) and Social specialist and Environment Specialist, MDSC. The Project level GRC will resolve the grievance within 14 days (about 2 weeks) of receipt of a complaint/ grievance, and
- (iii) **Apex level (third level):** If the grievance is not resolved at the Project level, the grievance will be referred to the Apex level, headed by the Honorable Mayor. The chief executive officer will support the grievance process. Other members include the Project Director, who will be the member secretary and NCC GRM focal officer. The grievance at this level will be resolved within 21 days (about 3 weeks) of receipt.

47. A representative of affected persons from each settlement will be a special invitee to the GRC meetings whenever required. If any grievance requires immediate and urgent attention, the Assistant Engineer/ Contractors safeguard personnel and social and environments officers and experts of PMU and MDSC will ensure the grievance is jointly and quickly responded to. Despite the Project GRM, an aggrieved person shall have access to the country's legal system at any stage. This can run parallel to accessing the GRM and is not dependent on the negative outcome of the GRM. The grievance redress process is explained in Figure 3.

48. **ADB's Accountability Mechanism.** The accountability mechanism provides an independent forum and process whereby people adversely affected by ADB-assisted projects can voice and seek a resolution to their problems and report alleged violations of ADB's operational policies and procedures. If the established GRM cannot resolve the issue, the affected person can use the ADB Accountability Mechanism by directly contacting (in writing) the Complaint Receiving Officer. Before submitting a complaint to the Accountability Mechanism, it is recommended that affected people make a good-faith effort to resolve their problems by working with the concerned ADB operations department (in this case, ADB Bangladesh Resident Mission). Only after doing that, and if they are still dissatisfied, should they approach the Accountability Mechanism.<sup>19</sup>

49. **Documentation.** PMU will be responsible for the timely registration of grievances, related disclosure, and communication with the aggrieved party. PMU will also ensure that all the details from submission to resolution are well recorded and documented.

50. **Record-keeping** The PMU will keep records of grievances received, including contact details of the complainant, the date the complaint was received, the nature of the grievance, agreed corrective actions, the date these were affected, and the final outcome. The number of grievances recorded and resolved and the outcomes will be available in the PMU office and reported in monitoring reports submitted to ADB semi-annually. All resolutions shall be communicated to the aggrieved party/complainant(s).

51. **Periodic review and documentation of lessons learned.** The PMU will periodically review the functioning of the GRM and record information on the effectiveness of the mechanism, especially on the program's ability to prevent and address grievances.

52. **Costs.** All costs related to resolving grievances (meetings, consultations, communication, and reporting/ information dissemination, as well as costs incurred by affected persons to attend GRC meetings, if any) will be borne by the Project.

## **VI. LEGAL FRAMEWORK**

53. The legal framework for the project is based on applicable legal and policy frameworks of the Government of Bangladesh (GoB), namely the Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property Act 2017 and ADB's Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS), 2009.

### **A. Government of Bangladesh Laws and Policies**

54. The principal legal instrument for governing land acquisition in Bangladesh is the Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property (ARIPA) Act 2017, which requires that compensation be paid for (i) land and assets permanently acquired (including land with 200 percent premium, structures (houses and business, trees and standing crops with 100 percent premium); (ii) any other impact caused by such acquisition. The Act provides certain safeguards for the owners and has provision for payment of "fair value" for the property acquired.

55. Under the Act, the government has an obligation to provide compensation only for the land/assets acquired.

### **B. ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement, 2009**

56. The ADB's Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS), 2009 recognizes and addresses involuntary resettlement impacts and requires the preparation of a resettlement plan in every instance where involuntary resettlement occurs. The ADB policy requirements are:

- (i) Avoid or minimize impacts where possible;
- (ii) Consultation with the displaced persons in project planning and implementation;
- (iii) Payments of compensation for acquired assets at the replacement cost;
- (iv) Ensure that no one is worse off as a result of resettlement and would maintain at least their original standard of living;
- (v) Resettlement assistance to displaced persons, including non-titled persons; and
- (vi) Special attention to vulnerable people/groups.

57. For any ADB operation requiring involuntary resettlement, resettlement planning is an integral part of project design, to be dealt with from the earliest stages of the project cycle. The main policy principles of the SPS, 2009 are:

- (i) Screen the project early on to identify past, present, and future involuntary resettlement impacts and risks. Determine the scope of resettlement planning through a survey and/or census of displaced persons, including a gender analysis specifically related to resettlement impacts and risks;
- (ii) Carry out meaningful consultations with displaced persons, host communities, and concerned NGOs. Inform all displaced persons of their entitlements and resettlement options. Ensure their participation in the planning, implementation, and monitoring and evaluation of resettlement aspects of the project. Pay particular attention to the needs of vulnerable groups, especially those below the poverty line, the landless, the elderly, women and children, and Indigenous Peoples, and landless (those without legal title to land), and ensure their participation in consultations. Establish a grievance redress mechanism to receive and facilitate resolution of the displaced persons' concerns. Support the social and cultural institutions of displaced persons and their host population. Where involuntary resettlement impacts and risks are highly complex and

- sensitive, compensation and resettlement decisions should be preceded by a social preparation phase;
- (iii) Improve, or at least restore, the livelihoods of all displaced persons through (a) land-based resettlement strategies when affected livelihoods are land-based where possible or cash compensation at replacement value for land when the loss of land does not undermine livelihoods; (b) prompt replacement of assets with access to assets of equal or higher value; (c) prompt compensation at full replacement cost for assets that cannot be restored; and (d) additional revenues and services through benefit sharing schemes where possible;
  - (iv) Provide physically and economically displaced persons with needed assistance, including: (a) if there is relocation, secured tenure to relocation land, better housing at resettlement sites with comparable access to employment and production opportunities, integration of resettled persons economically and socially into their host communities and extension of project benefits to host communities; (b) transitional support and development assistance, such as land development, credit facilities, training, or employment opportunities; and (c) civic infrastructure and community services, as required;
  - (v) Improve the standards of living of the displaced poor and other vulnerable groups, including women, to at least national minimum standards. In rural areas, provide them with legal and affordable access to land and resources, and in urban areas, provide them with appropriate income sources and legal and affordable access to adequate housing;
  - (vi) Develop procedures in a transparent, consistent, and equitable manner if land acquisition is through a negotiated settlement to ensure that those people who enter into negotiated settlements will maintain the same or better income and livelihood status;
  - (vii) Ensure that displaced persons without titles to land or any recognizable legal rights to land are eligible for resettlement assistance and compensation for loss of non-land assets;
  - (viii) Prepare a resettlement plan elaborating on displaced persons' entitlements, the income and livelihood restoration strategy, institutional arrangements, monitoring and reporting framework, budget, and time-bound implementation schedule;
  - (ix) Disclose a draft resettlement plan, including documentation of the consultation process in a timely manner, before project appraisal, in an accessible place, and in a form and language(s) understandable to displaced persons and other stakeholders. Disclose the final resettlement plan and its updates to displaced persons and other stakeholders;
  - (x) Conceive and execute involuntary resettlement as part of a development project or program. Include the full costs of resettlement in the presentation of project's costs and benefits. For a project with significant involuntary resettlement impacts, consider implementing the involuntary resettlement component of the project as a stand-alone operation;
  - (xi) Pay compensation and provide other resettlement entitlements before physical or economic displacement. Implement the resettlement plan under close supervision throughout project implementation; and
  - (xii) Monitor and assess resettlement outcomes, their impacts on the standards of living of displaced persons, and whether the objectives of the resettlement plan have been achieved by taking into account the baseline conditions and the results of resettlement monitoring. Disclose monitoring reports.

58. A comparison of the key provisions of the Acquisition and Requisition of Immovable Property (ARIPA) Act 2017 and ADB's SPS, 2009, and gap-filling measures is presented in **Appendix 6**. In sum, the 2017 Act does not cover project-displaced persons without titles, such as informal settlers (squatters), occupiers, and informal tenants and leaseholders (without registration documents). Further, the Act has no provision for the resettlement of affected households and businesses or any assistance for restoring the displaced persons' livelihoods. The project will follow the involuntary resettlement policy principles and the entitlement matrix to ensure the gaps between the ADB's SPS requirements and the Government of Bangladesh's laws are complied with. Bangladesh does not have any policy to cover impacts to non-tiled businesses occupying government-owned rights of way. This is a gap against ADB policy which provides for compensation at replacement cost to all affected persons, irrespective of their legal status.

## **VII. ENTITLEMENTS, ASSISTANCE AND BENEFITS**

### **A. Type of Losses and Affected Person Category**

59. The anticipated losses due to the proposed project components involve temporary income loss to businesses/mobile vendors along the road margin and impact to access due to the excavation of trenches for laying of pipelines and associated civil works.

60. In accordance with the involuntary resettlement principles adopted for this project, the affected persons falling in any of the following two categories will be eligible for compensation and resettlement assistance: (i) those who have formal legal rights to land lost in its entirety or in part; and (ii) those who lost the land they occupy in its entirety or in part and have neither formal legal rights nor recognized or recognizable claims to such land.

61. Based on the preliminary designs, inventory of loss surveys were conducted in December 2022 and August 2023. Through these surveys, the project has identified shops/businesses/vendors that are likely to face temporary disruption and will make necessary provisions during civil works for the continuance of access without disruption to their activity. Wherever avoidance and mitigation measures are not possible, the PMU will provide compensation and assistance to the affected persons in line with the agreed provisions contained in the entitlement matrix for temporary impacts and impacts during civil works.

### **B. Entitlements**

62. The entitlement matrix summarizes the types of possible losses and corresponding entitlements in accordance with ADB and government policies for temporary income loss during civil works. No relocation impact is anticipated in this project. The entitlement matrix relevant to this project is given in Table 13.

## VIII. RESETTLEMENT BUDGET AND FINANCING PLAN

63. The resettlement cost estimates include compensation for temporary loss of income to shop owners, including mobile vendors, lumpsum shifting for mobile vendors, vulnerable assistance, income loss to employees, compensation on account of loss of crops, consultation, grievance redress and awareness generation cost, and re-verification of the resettlement impacts during the detailed measurement survey. The government will bear all costs related to compensation and mitigation and will be responsible for releasing the funds for resettlement in a timely manner. The estimated total resettlement cost for the project is BDT 16.98 million. A detailed budget estimate is given in Table 14.

### A. Loss of Livelihood

64. The project entitlements for temporary loss of livelihood include:

65. **Temporary Income Loss:** Cash compensation equivalent to net income from the affected business for the period of disruption on producing relevant income or income tax return documents; in the absence of proper income documents, the income will be calculated on the basis of the information provided during the socio-economic survey. The average daily income estimated is 580 BDT for mobile vendors and BDT 850 for those carrying out commercial activities in structures. The income loss will be calculated based on actual days of work. For budgeting, four days have been considered (two days during shifting out to an alternate location and two days during return to the original location) for mobile vendors and seven days for those with structures.

66. **Loss of income to employees:** Employees will be provided with support for the actual days of income lost, if any. For the purpose of estimating and information gathered from surveys, the daily income for employees is estimated at BDT 500 per day.

67. **Shifting Assistance:** The affected persons who are required to shift will be provided with shifting assistance of 3000 BDT as a one-time lump sum to support the businesses in moving to a nearby location as provided by NCC.

68. **Additional Support to Vulnerable Persons:** Vulnerable households will receive a one-time cash compensation of BDT 10,000 to the affected vulnerable person.

### B. Temporary Impacts

69. The project provides mitigation measures for temporary disruption to shops/businesses/vendors during the excavation of trenches for laying water pipelines and associated civil works. It has been assessed that pipe laying works inside the carriageway will require temporary shifting. All temporarily disrupted commercial activities will be provided with

- (i) temporary access for the continuance of business or cash assistance for loss of income calculated for the actual number of days of livelihood disruption or if income loss cannot be assessed, cash assistance based on minimum wages for the duration of the actual number of days of livelihood disruption
- (ii) The project will provide alternate space for mobile vendors who can relocate to an adjacent place for the continuance of business and

- (iii) 30 days advance notice regarding construction activities, including duration of and type of damage to the structure.

### C. Compensation for loss of Crops/ fencing

70. A provisional budget has been provided for any seasonal cultivation/ crop loss/ loss of fencing while laying collector pipelines under contract 2. The NCC will ensure that people (if any) affected are compensated before start of civil works.

#### Note

Provisional sums for temporary income loss assistance are provided if such impacts cannot be avoided during implementation. If avoided/mitigated by providing alternate space to continue the business and ensuring they do not suffer even partial loss of income or through the use of trenchless technology, these amounts need not be spent. The basis for the estimated unit rate (average daily income) is as per the information collected during census surveys in December 2022 and August 2023. These estimates are only for budgetary purposes. During implementation, the PMU, with the support of MDSC, will assess the duration of income loss and quantum of income loss on a case-to-case basis and will provide assistance for loss of income. Crop loss, impact on fencing, or unanticipated impacts, if any, will be monitored and reported.

A shifting cost of BDT 3000 is provided for the shifting of mobile vendors, which is sufficient considering the actual costs of moving to an adjacent/ opposite location while construction activities are ongoing.

A provisional sum of BDT 10,00,000 for crop loss/fencing. If seasonal cropping is found at the start of construction, compensation for crop loss will be assessed and paid.

All 641 affected households are considered as nontitleholders and vulnerable. These estimates are for budgetary purposes. During DMS and census surveys, the PMU, with the support of MDSC, will re-verify the affected persons and their vulnerability.

The cost of restoration of affected ramps and cement concrete flooring is included in the contractor's scope; hence, no separate budgetary provision is made in this resettlement plan.

The contractor is liable to restore the damaged structure to its original condition; if it is not restored, the contractor shall pay the replacement cost without depreciation for any damages to assets/trees/crops in

## IX. INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

71. **Project Management Unit.** The NCC is the executing agency for the Project. A dedicated project management unit (PMU) has been established within the NCC. The PMU, headed by a project director (superintendent engineer rank officer), is responsible for overall project management, and is supported by three deputy project directors (executive engineer rank) and a chief social welfare officer.

72. The chief social welfare officer at PMU will be the nodal officer for social safeguards and gender and will be responsible for ensuring compliance with ADB's Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS), 2009, during the project implementation, including the monitoring and reporting. A qualified and experienced individual consultant designated as a social safeguards and gender officer will support the chief social welfare officer, who will be recruited from the open market and with relevant background (educational and professional). The following will be the social safeguards-related responsibilities of PMU:

- (i) Conduct screening of the project components for past, present, and future involuntary resettlement impacts and risks;
- (ii) Provide support to design the Project to avoid or minimize involuntary resettlement impacts;
- (iii) Liaise with district administration to obtain the land documents, ensure land availability and transfer of land, and the issuance of no objection certificates (as and when required) for all the projects;
- (iv) Ensure compliance with all national laws, rules, and regulations regarding land acquisition, land transfer, and issuance of no objection certificates;
- (v) Undertake the review of resettlement plans and DDRs prepared by the management, design, and supervision consultant (MDSC) and confirm compliance with ADB's requirements;
- (vi) Ensure that resettlement plans and DDRs are included in the bidding documents and civil works contracts;
- (vii) Ensure implementation of agreed safeguards documents;
- (viii) Conduct detailed measurement and verification surveys of affected persons, prepare a list of affected persons, and provide all data required to prepare/update resettlement plans and DDRs with support from the individual social safeguards consultant of PMU and safeguards specialist of MDSC;
- (ix) issue advance notices to all the stakeholders, including affected persons, informing them about the tentative schedule of works along with entitlement matrix and compensation packages and cut-off date;
- (x) Ensure availability of budget for resettlement and rehabilitation activities;
- (xi) Provide support to MDSC in preparation of the micro plans and ensure timely distribution of the compensation as per the agreed entitlement matrix;
- (xii) Ensure temporarily displaced persons (businesses/mobile vendors) are provided space to continue their business activities during construction and

- ensure these affected establishments can return to their original location after construction;
- (xiii) Ensure the contractors comply with the agreed resettlement plans and DDRs;
- (xiv) Ensuring adequate awareness campaigns are held throughout the project area, with a focus on vulnerable groups;
- (xv) Ensure timely disclosure of resettlement plans and DDRs at locations and form accessible to all the stakeholders, including the affected persons;
- (xvi) Collect the social safeguard monitoring information, prepare and ensure submission of the semi-annual social safeguard monitoring reports to ADB regularly up to issuance of project completion report;
- (xvii) Take proactive measures to address grievances promptly brought in through the grievance redress mechanism;
- (xviii) Organize/conduct periodic orientation programs to train project staff, consultants, and contractors, social safeguard and gender requirements related to mitigation measures; and
- (xix) Undertake immediate actions to resolve the unexpected adverse impacts identified during the execution of the Project.

73. **Management, design, and supervision consultant.** The Project will hire the services of MDSC to support PMU in the implementation and ensure compliance with the social safeguards' requirements. MDSC will mobilize international and national social safeguards specialists (on an intermittent basis), a community development officer, and three community mobilizers. The detailed social safeguards-related responsibilities of MDSC will include, but are not limited to, the following:


- (i) Ensure that resettlement plans and DDRs are prepared and updated promptly;
- (ii) Provide support to PMU in liaising with district administration to obtain the land documents, issuance of no objection certificates, and transfer of land (as and when required);
- (iii) Develop systems to monitor social safeguards and gender outcomes of the Project, including the functioning of the GRM, and prepare indicators for monitoring safeguards and gender parameters;
- (iv) Support the PMU in ensuring that the social safeguard and activities are carried out in accordance with government policy, agreed plans and in compliance with the SPS 2009;
- (v) Support the PMU in conducting the detailed measurement and verification surveys of affected persons, prepare a list of affected persons, provide all data required to prepare/update resettlement plans and DDRs,
- (vi) Prepare the micro plans and ensure timely distribution of the compensation as per the agreed entitlement matrix;
- (vii) Provide the support to address grievances promptly brought in through the grievance redress mechanism;
- (viii) Ensure that the relevant measures related to social safeguards specified in the resettlement plans and DDRs are incorporated in bidding documents and monitor their compliance on behalf of PMU/PIUs;
- (ix) Ensure monitoring of social safeguards plans and identify and address unanticipated impacts, if any;
- (x) Conduct regular consultations with all the stakeholders, including the affected persons;
- (xi) Support the PMU in ensuring temporarily displaced persons (businesses/mobile vendors) are provided space to continue their business activities during

construction and ensure these affected establishments return to their original location after construction;

- (xii) Prepare semi-annual social safeguards monitoring reports and submit them to ADB through PMU and
- (xiii) Conduct regular orientation programs to train project staff, consultants, and contractors, as well as social safeguard and gender requirements related to mitigation measures.

74. **Contractor.** The contractor will hire a dedicated EHS cum social supervisor within one month of mobilization who will ensure the following tasks.

- (i) Work in close coordination with the social safeguards staff of the PMU and MDSC to finalize the detailed design, keeping in view the safeguard principles adopted for the Project;
- (ii) Conduct detailed measurement surveys (DMS) jointly with PMU and MDSC at sites/sections ready for implementation to arrive at the final inventory of loss;
- (iii) Make efforts to avoid or mitigate the resettlement impacts through the design considerations in discussion with safeguards staff of PMU and MDSC;
- (iv) Ensure that no civil works are initiated in the stretch where there are affected persons without payment of compensation;
- (v) Assist with grievance redress and ensure recording, reporting, and follow-up for resolution of all grievances received;
- (vi) Understand the regulatory compliance requirements related to labor welfare, environmental and social safeguards, and occupational health and safety;
- (vii) Assist PMU in disclosing relevant information on safeguards (eligibility, entitlements, compensation, cut-off date, processes, timelines, GRM) to all the stakeholders, including affected persons.

#### D. Safeguards Capacity Development

76. The international social safeguards specialist at MDSC will be responsible for conducting periodic capacity building and training workshops on ADB's safeguards requirements for staff of NCC and contractors. During the implementation of the program, the safeguards-related training needs assessment would be conducted by the MDSC to develop the training schedule. The safeguards-related training modules include grievance redress mechanism (GRM) and problem-solving techniques.

77. MDSC will conduct a training and capacity-building program on resettlement management for the PMU, NCC officers, and contractors staff on issues concerning (i) public consultation and participation, (ii) entitlements disbursement mechanisms, (iii) grievance redress, (iv) monitoring of resettlement operation; and (v) disclosure methods. Specific modules customized for the available skill set shall be devised after assessing the target participants' capabilities and the project's requirements. Institutional capacity-building programs will involve training the PMU staff on environmental and social safeguards aspects. Table 16 provides the indicative training needs assessment.

## X. IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

78. The project will be implemented in line with the ADB's safeguard requirements and principles laid down in this resettlement plan. The implementation agency will ensure that project activities are synchronized between the resettlement plan implementation activities and the project civil works. The implementation of the resettlement plan will include (i) identification of cut-off date and notification, (ii) verification of losses and extent of impacts, (iii) finalization of entitlements and distribution of identity cards, (iv) consultations with affected persons on their needs and priorities, and (v) resettlement, provision of compensation and assistance to affected persons. The implementation agency will ensure that no physical or economic displacement of affected persons takes place until (i) compensation and assistance as per the entitlement matrix have been paid to each affected person and (iii) support is provided to those whose livelihoods are impacted to shift to another nearby location. However, public consultation and monitoring will be continued on an intermittent basis during the entire duration of the project. A tentative implementation schedule is provided in Table 17.

## XI. MONITORING AND REPORTING

### A. Monitoring

79. Monitoring and reporting are critical activities in involuntary resettlement to ameliorate problems the affected persons face and develop solutions immediately. The implementation of the resettlement plan will be closely monitored to provide the PMU with assistance from MDSC. Monitoring will involve (i) administrative monitoring to ensure that implementation is on schedule and problems are dealt with on a timely basis; (ii) socio-economic monitoring during and after any resettlement impact utilizing baseline information established through the socio-economic survey of affected persons undertaken during project sub-preparation; and (iii) overall monitoring to assess affected person status. The PMU shall ensure the implementation of safeguard requirements as provided in the legal agreements and submit semi-annual safeguard monitoring reports on their implementation performance. Table 18 tentatively lists the impact indicators to be studied to evaluate impacts after completing the project.

80. ADB will require the executing agency/implementation agency to:

- (i) establish and maintain procedures to monitor the progress of the implementation of safeguard plans,
- (ii) verify the compliance with safeguard measures and their progress toward intended outcomes,
- (iii) ensure the sufficient resources (human and financial) are made timely available to implement the specific action plan.
- (iv) document and disclose monitoring results and identify necessary corrective and preventive actions in the periodic monitoring reports,
- (v) follow up on these actions to ensure progress toward the desired outcomes and
- (vi) submit periodic monitoring reports on safeguard measures as agreed upon with ADB.

81. The MDSC will prepare quarterly progress and semi-annual monitoring reports for submission to ADB through PMU. The monitoring reports will be based on the outcome of consultations and feedback with people, details of surveys undertaken to assess temporary impacts, measures adopted to mitigate temporary impact to businesses and residences, and review of the progress of other implementation activities, including complaints/concerns/issues raised by the affected persons. The monitoring reports will describe the progress of resettlement activities and any compliance issues and corrective actions. These reports will closely follow the involuntary resettlement monitoring indicators agreed upon at resettlement plan approval. Monitoring will include (i) the communication and feedback of people; (ii) measures taken to mitigate temporary impacts and their adequacy and timeliness; (iii) use of grievance procedures; (iv) information dissemination to affected persons on benefits; and (v) implementation timetable. A sample monitoring template is given in Appendix 7.

The PMU, with the support of MDSC, will be responsible for certifying encumbrance-free stretches to be handed over to the contractors based on the completion of the disbursement of assistance for temporary income loss. The PMU will submit semi-annual monitoring reports during the civil work phase and until the issuance of the project completion report. The monitoring reports will be disclosed on ADB and NCC websites upon clearance by ADB.



#### Installation of Production Tubewell (PTW)


The identified sites for the installation of Production Tubewell (PTW) are located on the eastern bank of the river Shitalakhya at Narayanganj City Corporation (NCC). According to the Hon'ble High Court Division's Judgment (Judgment on writ petition No-3503/ 2009 attached Annex-1), NCC can make walkways/pavements or plantations with necessary development for public interest along the river bank to protect the river from illegal encroachment & river pollution, etc. Further, according to the minutes of the meeting (Annex-2) held on 11/02/2021 at the Ministry of Shipping (BIWTA is a Directorate under the Ministry of Shipping), it is mentioned that NCC can construct parks, playgrounds, and tree plantation with necessary development for public interest along the riverside if unused land is available. About the Project Co-ordination Committee (PCC) meeting held on 02/01/2023 at NCC (meeting minutes Annex-3), BIWTA representative mentioned that by getting funds they have been implementing the walkways /pavements i/c tree plantations to save the river immediately that was supposed to be done by the NCC as per writ petition no-3503 /2009 of Hon'able High court verdict.

According to a public consultation on Water Supply held at Nagar Bhaban on 7<sup>th</sup> December/2023 the participants from different entity, city dwellers and Ward Councilors of NCC made comments on the contamination of surface water and appreciated the proposal for installation of 20 nos. PTWs under the upcoming ADB assisted "Narayanganj Green and Resilient Urban Development Project (NGRUDP)". Through discussion followed by mutual understanding about scarcity of potable water in NCC area all participants including BIWTA requested NCC to install PTWs where unused land is controlled by BIWTA and have expressed their deep satisfaction for installation of 20 nos. production tube wells (PTWs) in order to reduce the potable water scarcity within the city area and will extend their necessary support for implementation of the project along the river bank of public land.



## 8. Discussion/Remarks/Recommendation:

Engr. Md. Abdul Aziz, PD PMU of NCC, the representative of Honourable Mayor, inaugurated the session. He extended a warm welcome to all the participants. He gave an introductory speech on the water supply project coming up in NCC. His speech rendered clarity towards the project and ensured future benefits to the public. He also emphasized upon the sustainability issues that the project is likely to be complied upon.

PSPS team distributed the handouts on existing situation, and long term and short-term plans for water supply in NCC (refer Annexure 2) to all the participants.

Mr. Seamus Baynes, Team Leader, PSPS team/consultant delivered the technical details of water supply project. He discussed on the long term and short-term approach. He explained the water sources and intakes, treatment plant rehabilitation, zone-wise water transmission and distribution. He specified the quantum of water production and delivery to the consumers, highlighting that the target water loss is 10% which presently is 60% approx. Thus, this project will bring out huge benefits to the residents of NCC with respect to quality, quantity and consistency in supply. He also indicated the cost involved in upgradation of the water supply system through this project and phasing of works with respect to allocated fund.



TL presented in English (refer Annexure 3). It was comprehensive and easy to understand. To make it further explicit and friendly, PSPS team member Mr. Parthajit Patra translated in Bangla as required.

Mr. Iktiarul Islam, Social Safeguard expert ADB, discussed the social and environmental impacts and safeguard policies that would be taken care during implementation of the project. He also urged for public cooperation and expected their support towards the project.

All the participants from communities, councillors and government officers from departments other than NCC gave their respective views. Their views were mostly common in appreciating the initiatives which NCC has taken up. The specific discussions were on transfer of power of water supply operation, work procedure in shifting water connection from existing to new pipelines and its potential temporary impacts, utilization of existing Sonakanda and Godnail WTPs, measures against unaccounted for water, water tariff and payment mechanism.



In response to queries from the audience, the PD explained that LICs would be provided water lines, ATM booths would be installed for safe drinking water at least possible charge. He further added that provisions would be made for water supply in future to the potential areas to be included in the NCC.

The IBF (Induced Bank Filtration) system to exploit surface water in compliance with government policy which would help averting high capital cost for construction of water treatment plant and recurring expenses for O&M, was also discussed in the meeting.

The elites from the Wards expressed enthusiasm for the water supply plan and interventions proposed and urged the authorities for efficient implementation urgently.

## **Appendix 7: Outline of Social Safeguards Monitoring Report**

Following requirements of the ADB Safeguard Policy Statement (2009) and the *Operations Manual* section on safeguard policy (OM F1), borrowers/clients are required to establish and maintain procedures to monitor the status of implementation of safeguard plans and ensure progress is made toward the desired outcomes. For projects categorized as A or B in Involuntary Resettlement and/or Indigenous People, the Borrowers/clients are required to submit semi-annual monitoring reports for ADB review. The level of detail and comprehensiveness of a monitoring report is commensurate with the complexity and significance of social safeguards impacts (IR) and with the current status of project implementation phase.

This outline can be used for periodic monitoring report (semiannual) and RP completion report to start the civil works in the impacted areas. A safeguard monitoring report may include the following elements:

### **A. Executive Summary**

This section provides a concise statement of project scope and impacts, key findings and recommended actions.

### **B. Background of the Report and Project Description**

This section provides a general description of the project, including:

- (i) Background/context of the monitoring report which includes the information on the project, project components, safeguards categorizations and general scope of the social safeguards impacts.
- (ii) Information on the implementation progress of the project activities, scope of monitoring report and requirements, reporting period, including frequency of submission and changes in project scope and adjusted safeguard measures, if applicable
- (iii) Summary table of identified impacts and the mitigation actions.

### **C. Scope of Impacts**

This section outlines the detail of

- (i) Scale and scope of the project's safeguards impacts,
- (ii) Vulnerability status of the affected people/communities,
- (iii) Entitlements matrix and other rehabilitation measures, as applicable, as described in the approved final resettlement plan(s).

### **D. Compensation and Rehabilitation<sup>25</sup>**

This section describes the process and progress of the implementation of the safeguards plan and other required activities as determined in the plan. This includes:

- (i) Payment of the affected assets compensation, allowances, loss of incomes, etc. to the entitled persons;
- (ii) Provisions of other types of entitlement as described in the matrix and implementation of livelihood rehabilitation activities as determined in the plan.

Quantitative as well as qualitative results of the monitoring parameters, as agreed in the plan, should be provided.

#### **E. Public participation and consultation**

This section describes public participation and consultations activities during the project implementation as agreed in the plan. This includes final consultations with affected persons during resettlement plan finalization after the completion of detail design; the numbers of activities conducted; issues raised during consultations and responses provided by the project team, implementing NGOs, project support consultants, contractors, etc.

#### **F. Grievance Redress Mechanism**

This section described the implementation of project grievance redress mechanism (GRM) as design in the approved resettlement plan. This includes evaluations of its effectiveness, procedures, complaints receive, timeliness to resolve issues/ complaints and resources provided to solve the complaints. Special attentions should be given if there are complaints received from the affected people or communities.

#### **G. Institutional Arrangement**

This section describes the actual implementation or any adjustment made to the institutional arrangement for managing the social safeguards issues in the projects. This includes the establishment of safeguards unit/ team and appointment of staff in the executing/implementing agency; implementation of the GRM and its committee; supervision and coordination between institutions involved in the management and monitoring of safeguards issues, the roles of NGO and women's groups in the monitoring and implementation of the plan, if any.

#### **H. Monitoring Results - Findings**

This section describes the summary and key findings of the monitoring activities. The results are compared against previously established benchmarks and compliance status (e.g., adequacy of IR compensation rates and timeliness of payments, adequacy and timeliness of IR rehabilitation measures including serviced housing sites, house reconstruction, livelihood support measures, and training; budget for implementing resettlement plan, timeliness and adequacy of capacity building, etc.). It also compared against the objectives of safeguards or desired outcomes documented (e.g., involuntary resettlement impacts avoided or minimized; livelihood restored or enhanced; If noncompliance or any major gaps identified, include the recommendation of corrective action plan.

#### **I. Compliance Status**

This section will summarize the compliance status of the project activities with the loan covenants, ADB SPS (2009) on safeguard resettlement (SR) 2 and the approved final resettlement plan (s).

## **J. Follow up Actions, Recommendation and Disclosure**

This section describes recommendations and further actions or items to focus on for the remaining monitoring period. It also includes lesson learned for improvement for future safeguards monitoring activities. Disclosure dates of the monitoring report to the affected communities should also be included. A time-bound summary table for required actions should be included, with the following:

- (i) List of affected persons and entitlements
- (ii) Summary of resettlement plan with entitlement matrix
- (iii) Copies of affected persons
- (iv) Summary of minutes of meetings during public consultations
- (v) Summary of complaints received and status of their resolution.
